4. Section 4011 of the Code provides that the Board shall administer and enforce both the Pharmacy Law [Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4000 et seq.] and the Uniform Controlled Substances Act [Health & Safety Code, § 11000 et seq.].

5. Section 4300(a) of the Code provides that every license issued by the Board may be suspended or revoked. 5

6. Section 118(b) of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that the suspension, expiration, 6 surrender, or cancellation of a license shall not deprive the Board of jurisdiction to proceed with a 7 disciplinary action during the period within which the license may be renewed, restored, reissued 8 or reinstated. Section 4402(a) of the Code provides that any pharmacist license that is not 9 renewed within three years following its expiration may not be renewed, restored, or reinstated 10 and shall be canceled by operation of law at the end of the three-year period. Section 4402(e) of 11 the Code provides that any other license issued by the Board may be canceled by the Board if not 12 renewed within 60 days after its expiration, and will require a new application. 13

STATUTORY AND REGULATORY PROVISIONS

7. Section 4301 of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that the Board shall take action 15 against any holder of a license who is guilty of "unprofessional conduct," defined to include, but 16 not be limited to, any of the following: 17

(f) The commission of any act involving moral turpitude, dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or 18 corruption, whether the act is committed in the course of relations as a licensee or otherwise, and 19 whether the act is a felony or misdemeanor or not. 20

(h) The administering to oneself, of any controlled substance, or the use of any dangerous 21 drug or of alcoholic beverages to the extent or in a manner as to be dangerous or injurious to 22 oneself, [another licensee, person, or the public], or to the extent that the use impairs the ability of 23 the person to conduct with safety to the public the practice authorized by the license. 24

(i) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, of any other state, or of the United 25 States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs. 26

(1) The conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties 27 of a licensee under this chapter. 28

(o) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or abetting the violation of or conspiring to violate any provision or term of this chapter or of the applicable federal and state laws and regulations governing pharmacy, including regulations established by the board or by any other state or federal regulatory agency.

California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, states:

"For the purpose of denial, suspension, or revocation of a personal or facility license pursuant to Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475) of the Business and Professions Code, a crime or act shall be considered substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a licensee or registrant if to a substantial degree it evidences present or potential unfitness of a licensee or registrant to perform the functions authorized by her license or registration in a manner consistent with the public health, safety, or welfare."

9. Section 4059 of the Code, in pertinent part, prohibits furnishing of any dangerous
 drug or dangerous device except upon the prescription of an authorized prescriber.

14 10. Section 4060 of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that no person shall possess any
15 controlled substance, except that furnished upon a valid prescription/drug order.

16 11. Health and Safety Code section 11170 provides that no person shall prescribe,
administer, or furnish a controlled substance for himself or herself.

18 12. Health and Safety Code section 11173, subdivision (a), provides that no person shall
obtain or attempt to obtain controlled substances, or procure or attempt to procure the
administration of or prescription for controlled substances, (1) by fraud, deceit, misrepresentation,
or subterfuge; or (2) by the concealment of a material fact.

13. Health and Safety Code section 11350, in pertinent part, makes it unlawful to possess
any controlled substance listed in Schedule II (Health and Safety Code section 11055),
subdivision (b) or (c), or any narcotic drug in Schedules III-V, absent a valid prescription.

14. Health and Safety Code section 11550, in pertinent part, makes it unlawful for any
person to use or be under the influence of any controlled substance in Schedule II (Health and
Safety Code section 11055), subdivision (c), or any narcotic drug in Schedules III-V, except when
administered by or under the direction of an authorized licensee.

1	15. Section 125.3 of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the
2	administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation of the licensing
3	act to pay a sum not to exceed its reasonable costs of investigation and enforcement.
4	CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES / DANGEROUS DRUGS
5	16. Section 4021 of the Code states:
6	"Controlled substance' means any substance listed in Chapter 2 (commencing with Section
7	11053) of Division 10 of the Health and Safety Code."
8	17. Section 4022 of the Code states, in pertinent part:
9	"Dangerous drug' or 'dangerous device' means any drug or device unsafe for self use,
10	except veterinary drugs that are labeled as such, and includes the following:
11	"(a) Any drug that bears the legend: 'Caution: federal law prohibits dispensing without
12	prescription,' 'Rx only,' or words of similar import
13	"(c) Any other drug or device that by federal or state law can be lawfully dispensed only on
14	prescription or furnished pursuant to Section 4006."
15	18. Norco, Vicodin, Vicodin ES, Lortab, and Lorcet are among the brand names for
16	compounds of varying dosages of acetaminophen (aka APAP) and Hydrocodone, a Schedule III
17	controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11056(e)(4) and dangerous
18	drug as designated by Business and Professions Code section 4022. The varying compounds are
19	also known generically as Hydrocodone with APAP. These are all narcotic drugs.
20	19. Valium is a brand name for diazepam, a Schedule IV controlled substance as
21	designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(d)(9) and a dangerous drug as designated by
22	Business and Professions Code section 4022. It is an anxiety-reducing/depressant drug.
23	20. Ativan is a brand name for lorazepam, a Schedule IV controlled substance as
24	designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(d)(16) and a dangerous drug as designated
25	by Business and Professions Code section 4022. It is an anxiety-reducing/depressant drug.
26	21. Fastin and Adipex are brand names for phentermine, a Schedule IV controlled
27	substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(f)(4) and a dangerous drug as
28	designated by Business and Professions Code section 4022. It is a stimulant/anorexant drug.

Ambien is a brand name for zolpidem, a Schedule IV controlled substance as 1 22. designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(d)(32) and a dangerous drug as designated 2 by Business and Professions Code section 4022. It is a depressant drug/sleep aid. 3 23. Soma is a brand name for **carisoprodol**, a dangerous drug as designated by Business 4 and Professions Code section 4022. It is a muscle relaxant drug. 5 FACTUAL BACKGROUND 6 24. 7 From an unknown start date until on or about April 13, 2010, Respondent was employed by Costco pharmacies as a staff pharmacist in at least two pharmacies: Costco #472 in 8 Salinas, CA (PHY 43162) and Costco # 131 in Sand City, CA (PHY 40373), where by virtue of 9 his licensure and employment he had access to controlled substances and dangerous drugs. 10 25. During his Costco employment, Respondent used this access to divert/steal, and self-11 administer, controlled substances/dangerous drugs, including Hydrocodone with APAP. 12 26. The exact number of instances of diversion/theft by Respondent, and the full quantity 13 of controlled substances or dangerous drugs diverted/stolen, are not known, but investigations by 14 Costco Pharmacy, police, and Board Inspector(s) revealed/reported the following: 15 On or about January 21. 2010, Respondent was stopped by California Highway a. 16 17 Patrol Officer(s) after he was observed driving erratically, including crossing the double-yellow lane divider and nearly colliding with oncoming traffic. There was a smell of alcohol from his 18 vehicle, and Respondent displayed objective signs or symptoms of being intoxicated or under the 19 influence of alcohol or drugs, including red and watery eyes and slurred speech. Respondent had 20 problems with his balance and could not perform Field Sobriety Tests (FSTs), but Respondent's 21 measured blood alcohol (breathalyzer readings of 0.043 and 0.041) did not exceed the legal limit. 22 A certified Drug Recognition Evaluator (DRE) officer conducted an examination and determined 23 that Respondent was under the influence of a combination of alcohol, a CNS depressant, a CNS 24 stimulant, and a narcotic analgesic. Respondent was placed under arrest for driving under the 25 influence of alcohol and/or drugs (Vehicle Code section 23152(a)), and transported to the County 26 Jail. Prior to entry, Respondent tried to conceal a sock down the back of his pants. A search of 27 the sock revealed several (16 tablets) prescription pharmaceuticals, later identified as: 28

1	• three (3) blue tablets of Hydrocodone with APAP 10/650mg;	
2	• two (2) white tablets of Hydrocodone with APAP 10/660mg;	
3	• two (2) blue tablets of Hydrocodone with APAP 10/500mg;	
4	• six (6) white tablets of Carisoprodol 350mg; and	
5	• three (3) blue tablets of Diazepam 10mg .	
6	b. On or about April 8, 2010, Respondent was working at Costco #472 (Salinas).	
7	A pharmacy technician also working that day saw Respondent pour Hydrocodone with APAP	
8	tablets from a stock bottle into his hand, and then place them in his pocket. When Respondent	
9.	was confronted by a manager and a witness and asked to empty his pockets, one pocket contained	
10	approximately five (5) to eight (8) tablets of yellow Hydrocodone with APAP 10/325mg and	
11	approximately twenty (20) white tablets of Soma (Carisoprodol 350mg). When the manager	
12	sought to confiscate the drugs for investigation purposes, Respondent picked up all 5-8 of the	
13	Hydrocodone with APAP tablets, put them in his mouth, and swallowed them. Respondent later	
14	denied that there ever had been any Hydrocodone tablets, or that he had swallowed them.	
15	c. The pharmacy inventory for that day showed a loss/shortage of six (6) tablets of	
16	Hydrocodone with APAP 10/325mg and twenty (20) tablets of Carisoprodol 350mg.	
17	d. On or about April 9, 2010, Costco # 472 (Salinas) submitted a Report of Theft	
18	or Loss of Controlled Substances (DEA Form 106) to the DEA, and to the Board, listing a theft of	
19	six (6) tablets of Hydrocodone with APAP 10/325mg, attributed to Respondent's pilferage.	
20	e. On or about April 15, 2010, Costco # 131 (Sand City) submitted a Report of	
21	Theft or Loss of Controlled Substances (DEA Form 106) to the DEA, and to the Board, listing a	
22	theft of 141 tablets Diazepam 10mg (Valium), 33 tablets Hydrocodone with APAP 5/500mg,	
23	21 tablets Hydrocodone with APAP 5/325mg, 19 tablets Hydrocodone with APAP 10/325mg,	
24	64 tablets Lorazepam 1mg (Ativan), 11 tablets Hydrocodone with APAP 10/500mg, 14 tablets	
25	Hydrocodone with APAP 10/325mg, 10 tablets Hydrocodone with APAP 7.5/325mg, 16	
26	tablets Phentermine 37.5mg (Fastin/Adipex), 17 tablets Zolpidem (Ambien), 21 tablets	
.27	Hydrocodone with Ibuprofen, and 143 tablets Carisoprodol 350mg (Soma).

1	f. On or about April 30, 2010, Costco Pharmacy reported to the Board that on or
2	about April 13, 2010 Respondent had been terminated from Costco for theft of prescription drugs.
3	g. On or about May 11, 2010, Respondent admitted to Board Inspector(s) that he
4	had used "bad judgment" during the incident leading to his arrest. In response to a question about
5	whether he had an addiction problem, Respondent admitted that "at one point" his drug use may
6	have gotten "out of hand," though he felt that as of that date he was moving past that.
7	FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE
8	(Acts Involving Moral Turpitude, Dishonesty, Fraud, Deceit or Corruption)
9	27. Respondent is subject to discipline under section 4301(f) of the Code, in that
10	Respondent, as described in paragraphs 24 to 26 above, committed acts involving moral
11	turpitude, dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or corruption.

13	(Self-Administration of Controlled Substance(s))
14	28. Respondent is subject to discipline under section 4301(h) of the Code, and/or 4301(j)
15	and/or (0) of the Code and/or Health and Safety Code section 11170, in that Respondent, as
16	described in paragraphs 24 to 26 above, administered controlled substance(s) to himself.
17	THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE
18	(Furnishing of Controlled Substance(s))
19	29. Respondent is subject to discipline under section 4301(j) and/or (o) and/or section
