21	1.ee Virginia Herold (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official capacityee
22	as the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy, Department of Consumer Affairs.
23	2.ee On or about January 12, 2010, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacy Technicianee
24	Registration Number TCH 98152 to Cammie Lee Quinn (Respondent). The Pharmacy
25	Technician Registration was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the charges brought
26	herein and will expire on January 31, 2012, unless renewed.
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Accusation

JURISDICTION

- 3. This Accusation is brought before the Board of Pharmacy (Board), Department of Consumer Affairs, under the authority of the following laws. All section references are to the Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.
- 4. Section 118, subdivision (b), of the Code provides that the suspension, expiration, surrender, cancellation of a license shall not deprive the Board of jurisdiction to proceed with a disciplinary action during the period within which the license may be renewed, restored, reissued or reinstated.
- 5. Section 4300, subdivision (a) of the Code states in pertinent part, "every license issued may be suspended or revoked."

STATUTORY PROVISIONS

6. Section 4060 of the Code states:

No person shall possess any controlled substance, except that furnished to a person upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.7, or furnished pursuant to a drug order issued by a certified nurse-midwife pursuant to Section 2746.51, a nurse practitioner pursuant to Section 2836.1, or a physician assistant pursuant to Section 3502.1, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.5, or a pharmacist pursuant to either subparagraph (D) of paragraph (4) of, or clause (iv) of subparagraph (A) of paragraph (5) of, subdivision (a) of Section 4052. This section shall not apply to the possession of any controlled substance by a manufacturer, wholesaler, pharmacy, pharmacist, physician, podiatrist, dentist, optometrist, veterinarian, naturopathic doctor, certified nurse-midwife, nurse practitioner, or physician assistant, when in stock in containers correctly labeled with the name and address of the supplier or producer.

Nothing in this section authorizes a certified nurse-midwife, a nurse practitioner, a physician assistant, or a naturopathic doctor, to order his or her own stock of dangerous drugs and devices.

7. Section 4301 of the Code states:

The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

drive straight. The officer also observed the vehicle cross quickly over the painted marks on the road, and the driver's side tires cross into the opposite traffic lane several times. The officer then initiated a traffic stop of the vehicle and identified Respondent as the driver. When the officer approached the vehicle, he smelled a burned marijuana odor coming from the vehicle. The officer asked Respondent and her two passengers if they had anything illegal in the vehicle. All three individuals responded stated, "no." The officer observed that Respondent had constricted pupils consistent with being under the influence of opiates, and that her passengers had watery and bloodshot eyes consistent with smoking marijuana. Respondent consented to a vehicle search, exited the vehicle and placed her purse on the driver's seat.

- 12. The officer searched the vehicle and Respondent's purse. The officer discovered flakes of marijuana on the rear-passenger floor and remnants of a burnt marijuana cigarette under the driver's seat. In Respondent's purse, the officer discovered a plastic pill container (that also worked as a pill crusher/cutter) that contained half of an 80 mg Oxycontin pill, two ink pen sleeves with a yellow/brown residue inside and on the outer edges and one with an outer edge of black residue, and a medication bottle labeled Suboxone (without any identifying information on the partially-torn label) with 15 whole and 4 half Suboxone pills inside.
- 13. The officer asked Respondent what medications she was prescribed. Respondent stated that she was prescribed Oxycontin and Suboxone. The officer asked Respondent if she smoked her Oxycontin and she stated, "sometimes I do." Respondent also admitted that she had been prescribed Oxycontin for 4 years and that she took Suboxone to counter the effects of the Oxycontin withdrawal. She stated that she commutes to Tustin for her Oxycontin refills because most pharmacies do not dispense the crushable form, however, the Tustin pharmacy she goes to dispenses the crushable pill.
- 14. The officer asked Respondent if she was currently prescribed Suboxone, to which Respondent replied, "I was." Respondent then informed the officer that her boyfriend obtained a prescription for Suboxone and provided her with the pills in order to assist her with withdrawals of Oxycontin use. Respondent admitted that the pills currently possessed in the bottle were the

one's provided by her boyfriend. The officer then placed Respondent under arrest for violation of Health and Safety Code section 11377(a), possession of a controlled substance.

- 15. The officer then asked Respondent again where she obtained the Suboxone. Respondent stated, "from the doctor." The officer asked Respondent what doctor had she obtained them from and Respondent stated, "I'm not sure the name, my boyfriend got it for me." Respondent admitted that she did not possess a valid prescription for Suboxone. Respondent then stated that her boyfriend provided her with the pills, that she was previously prescribed Suboxone by a doctor approximately 3 months prior but she was unable to provide any information about the doctor.
- 16. Respondent did not fill a prescription for Suboxone from January 1, 2007 through December 31, 2010.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct – Violating Laws Regulating Controlled Substances)

17. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action for unprofessional conduct under section 4301(j) of the Code in that Respondent possessed a controlled substance, Suboxone, without a valid prescription in violation of the California Uniform Controlled Substances Act (Health and Safety Code Sections 11000, et. Seq.), as evidenced by her admissions set forth in paragraphs 11-16 above, incorporated herein by reference.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct – Violation of Chapter)

18. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action for unprofessional conduct under section 4301(o) of the Code, in that Respondent violated the Pharmacy Act by illegally possessing a controlled substance in violation of Code section 4060, and by violating Health and Safety Code section 11377(a), as evidenced by her admissions set forth in paragraphs 11-16 above, incorporated herein by reference.

PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged, and that following the hearing, the Board of Pharmacy issue a decision:
