JURISDICTION

- 3. This Accusation is brought before the Board of Pharmacy (Board), under the authority of the following laws. All section references are to the Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.
- 4. Section 4300 of the Code permits the Board to take disciplinary action to suspend or revoke a license issued by the Board.
 - 5. Section 4301 of the Code states:

"The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct . . . Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

"(h) The administering to oneself, of any controlled substance, or the use of any dangerous drug or of alcoholic beverages to the extent or in a manner as to be dangerous or injurious to oneself, to a person holding a license under this chapter, or to any other person or to the public, or to the extent that the use impairs the ability of the person to conduct with safety to the public the practice authorized by the license."

"(j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, or any other state, or of the United States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs.

- "(p) Actions or conduct that would have warranted denial of a license."
- 6. Section 4327 of the Code states that "[a]ny person who, while on duty, sells, dispenses or compounds any drug while under the influence of any dangerous drug or alcoholic beverages shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."
- 7. Section 118, subdivision (b), of the Code provides that the suspension, expiration, surrender, or cancellation of a license shall not deprive the Board of jurisdiction to proceed with a disciplinary action during the period within which the license may be renewed, restored, reissued or reinstated.

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8. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, states:

"For the purpose of denial, suspension, or revocation of a personal or facility license pursuant to Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475) of the Business and Professions Code, a crime or act shall be considered substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a licensee or registrant if to a substantial degree it evidences present or potential unfitness of a licensee or registrant to perform the functions authorized by his license or registration in a manner consistent with the public health, safety, or welfare."

COST RECOVERY

9. Section 125.3 of the Code states, in part, that the Board may request the administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of the case.

STATE DRUG STATUTES

- 10. Health and Safety Code section 11170 states: "No person shall prescribe, administer, or furnish a controlled substance for himself."
- 11. Health and Safety Code section 11171 states: "No person shall prescribe, administer, or furnish a controlled substance except under the conditions and in the manner provided by this division."
- 12. Section 4022 of the Code prohibits the dispensing or furnishing of a dangerous drug or dangerous device, which is any drug or device that is unsafe for self-use in humans or animals, without a prescription or as legally authorized.

CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE/DANGEROUS DRUG

13. Marijuana is a Schedule I controlled substance as defined in Health and Safety Code section 11054, subdivision (d)(13) and a dangerous drug according to Business and Professions Code section 4022.

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FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Use of Controlled Substances and Dangerous Drugs)

14. Respondent has subjected her license to disciplinary action under section 4301, subdivision (h), on the grounds of unprofessional conduct, in that Respondent used controlled substances. Specifically, on or about October 25, 2010, Respondent tested positive for Marijuana, without a prescription, while on duty as a pharmacy technician at Rite Aid Store #5847, located in Tehachapi, California.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Violation of State Laws Regulating Controlled Substances)

- 15. Respondent has subjected her license to disciplinary action under section 4301, subdivision (j), on the grounds of unprofessional conduct, as follows:
- a. Respondent violated Business and Professions Code section 4327, by being under the influence of a controlled substance and dangerous drug, Marijuana, while on duty as a pharmacy technician at Rite Aid Store #5847, located in Tehachapi, California, as set forth in paragraph 14, above.
- b. Respondent violated Health and Safety Code sections 11170 and 11171, by using a controlled substance and dangerous drug, Marijuana, without a prescription, as set forth in paragraph 14, above.

THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct)

Respondent has subjected her license to disciplinary action under section 4301, subdivision (p), on the grounds of unprofessional conduct, in that Respondent engaged in actions or conduct that would have warranted the denial of a pharmacy technician's license, as set forth in paragraphs 14 and 15, above.

PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged, and that following the hearing, the Board of Pharmacy issue a decision:
