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18	Complainant alleges:
19	PARTIES
20	1. Virginia Herold (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity
21	as the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy, Department of Consumer Affairs.
22	2. On or about December 2, 2011, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacy Technician
23	Registration Number TCH 116452 to Michelle J. Caldera (Respondent). The Pharmacy
24	Technician Registration expired on June 30, 2013, and has not been renewed.
25	JURISDICTION
26	3. This Accusation is brought before the Board of Pharmacy (Board), Department of
27	Consumer Affairs, under the authority of the following laws. All section references are to the
28	Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.
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4. Section 4300 subdivision (a) of the Code states: "Every license issued may be
 suspended or revoked."

5. Section 118, subdivision (b), of the Code provides that the suspension, expiration, surrender, or cancellation of a license shall not deprive the Board of jurisdiction to proceed with a disciplinary action during the period within which the license may be renewed, restored, reissued or reinstated.

STATUTORY PROVISIONS

6. Section 490 states, in pertinent part:

9 "(a) In addition to any other action that a board is permitted to take against a licensee, a
10 board may suspend or revoke a license on the ground that the licensee has been convicted of a
11 crime, if the crime is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of the business
12 or profession for which the license was issued.

"(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a board may exercise any authority to
discipline a licensee for conviction of a crime that is independent of the authority granted under
subdivision (a) only if the crime is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties
of the business or profession for which the licensee's license was issued.

"(c) A conviction within the meaning of this section means a plea or verdict of guilty or a
conviction following a plea of nolo contendere. Any action that a board is permitted to take
following the establishment of a conviction may be taken when the time for appeal has elapsed, or
the judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal, or when an order granting probation is
made suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under the
provisions of Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code. ..."

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7. Section 4301 of the Code states:

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The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

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"(f) The commission of any act involving moral turpitude, dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or corruption, whether the act is committed in the course of relations as a licensee or otherwise, and whether the act is a felony or misdemeanor or not.

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"(h) The administering to oneself, of any controlled substance, or the use of any dangerous drug or of alcoholic beverages to the extent or in a manner as to be dangerous or injurious to oneself, to a person holding a license under this chapter, or to any other person or to the public, or to the extent that the use impairs the ability of the person to conduct with safety to the public the practice authorized by the license.

"(j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, or any other state, or of the United States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs.

"(1) The conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a licensee under this chapter. The record of conviction of a violation of Chapter 13 (commencing with Section 801) of Title 21 of the United States Code regulating controlled substances or of a violation of the statutes of this state regulating controlled substances or dangerous drugs shall be conclusive evidence of unprofessional conduct. In all other cases, the record of conviction shall be conclusive evidence only of the fact that the conviction occurred. The board may inquire into the circumstances surrounding the commission of the crime, in order to fix the degree of discipline or, in the case of a conviction not involving controlled substances or dangerous drugs, to determine if the conviction is of an offense substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a licensee under this chapter. A plea or verdict of guilty or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere is deemed to be a conviction within the meaning of this provision. The board may take action when the time for appeal has elapsed, or the judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal or when an order granting probation is made suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code allowing the person to withdraw his or her plea of guilty and to enter a plea of not guilty, or setting aside the verdict of guilty, or dismissing the accusation, information, or indictment.

"(o) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or abetting the violation of or conspiring to violate any provision or term of this chapter or of the applicable federal and state laws and regulations governing pharmacy, including regulations established by the board or by any other state or federal regulatory agency.

"(p) Actions or conduct that would have warranted denial of a license."

1	8. Section 4059 of the Code states, in pertinent part, that a person may not furnish any
2	dangerous drug except upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist,
3	veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.7.
4	9. Section 4060 of the Code states:
5	No person shall possess any controlled substance, except that furnished to a
6	person upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.7, or furnished
7	pursuant to a drug order issued by a certified nurse-midwife pursuant to Section 2746.51, a nurse practitioner pursuant to Section 2836.1, or a physician assistant
8	pursuant to Section 3502.1, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.5, or a pharmacist pursuant to either subparagraph (D) of paragraph (4) of, or clause (iv) of the pharmacist pursuant (Δ) of section (Δ) of (Δ) o
9	subparagraph (A) of paragraph (5) of, subdivision (a) of Section 4052. This section shall not apply to the possession of any controlled substance by a manufacturer, subclosely a character physician production doubt doubt and production.
10	wholesaler, pharmacy, pharmacist, physician, podiatrist, dentist, optometrist, veterinarian, naturopathic doctor, certified nurse-midwife, nurse practitioner, or physician assistant, when in stock in containers correctly labeled with the name and
11	address of the supplier or producer.
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13	10. Health and Safety Code section 11170 states "[n]o person shall prescribe, administer,
14	or furnish a controlled substance for himself."
15	REGULATORY PROVISIONS
16	11. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770 states, in pertinent part:
17	"For the purpose of denial, suspension, or revocation of a personal or facility license
18	pursuant to Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475) of the Business and Professions Code, a
19	crime or act shall be considered substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a
20	licensee or registrant if to a substantial degree it evidences present or potential unfitness of a
21	licensee or registrant to perform the functions authorized by his license or registration in a manner
22	consistent with the public health, safety, or welfare."
23	<u>COST RECOVERY</u>
24	12. Section 125.3 of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the
25	administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of
26	the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and
27	enforcement of the case, with failure of the licentiate to comply subjecting the license to not being
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renewed or reinstated. If a case settles, recovery of investigation and enforcement costs may be 1 included in a stipulated settlement. 2 DRUGS 3 Norco, a brand name for Hydrocodone/APAP 5/325 and Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325, 13. 4 which is a Schedule III controlled substance, a dangerous drug pursuant to Code section 4022, and 5 is used to treat moderate to severe pain. 6 14. Vicodin and Vicodin ES, a brand name for Hydrocodone/APAP 5/500 and 7 Hydrocodone/APAP 7.5/750, which is a Schedule III controlled substance, a dangerous drug 8 pursuant to Code section 4022, and is used to treat moderate to severe pain. 9 FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE 10 (Conviction of a Substantially Related Crime) 11 Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under sections 4300, 4301, 15. 12 subdivision (1), and 490, in conjunction with California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 13 1770, in that Respondent was convicted of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, 14 functions, and duties of a pharmacy technician. 15 On or about July 23, 2012, after pleading guilty, Respondent was convicted of one 16 a. felony count of violating Penal Code section 484(A), misdemeanor [theft of personal property] in 17 the criminal proceeding entitled The People of the State of California vs. Michelle Caldera, 18 (Super. Ct. San Bernardino County, No. MVA1201093). The court sentenced Respondent to a 36 19 month probation and she was required to serve 68 days in San Bernardino Co jail and pay a fine 20 including victim restitution. Respondent was also ordered to stay away from Rite Aid-15331 21 Baseline Ave Fontana CA 92335. 22° b. The circumstances surrounding the conviction are that between July 2011 and April 23 11, 2012, while working as a pharmacy technician at Rite Aid# 6482, Respondent diverted 24 prescription drugs from the pharmacy, including Hydrocodone/APAP, for self use. An audit of 25 the pharmacy, during the relevant time period, revealed a loss of the following: 26 Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325 (2050 tablets); Hydrocodone/ APAP 5/500 (1302 tablets); 27 Hydrocodone/ APAP 5/325 346 tablets; and Hydrocodone/APAP 7.5/750 (149 tablets). 28 5

1	SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE
2	(Unprofessional Conduct- Possession of Controlled Substance without a Prescription)
3	16. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Business and Professions
4	Code sections 4301 (f) and (j) in that while she was working as a pharmacy technician at Rite Aid
5	# 6482 (PHY 48336), located at 15331 Baseline Avenue, Fontana, California, Respondent
6	engaged in unprofessional conduct in that she engaged in acts that constitute dishonesty and/or
7	corruption, that are in violation of any statutes regulating controlled substances and dangerous
8	drugs. The circumstances are set forth above in paragraph 15(b) and incorporated herein as
9	though set forth fully herein.
10	THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE
11	(Unprofessional Conduct- Dispensing or Compounding
12	While Under the Influence of Drugs)
13	17. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Business and Professions Code
14	section 4301 (h) in that while she was working as a pharmacy technician at Rite Aid # 6482,
15	Respondent administered to herself controlled substances without a lawful prescription for self
16	use, to the extent that the use impaired her ability to conduct with safety to the public the practice
17	authorized by the license. The circumstances are set forth above in paragraph 15(b) and
18	incorporated herein as though set forth fully herein.
19	FOURTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE
20	(Unprofessional Conduct- Actions or Conduct that Warrant Denial of a License)
21	18. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Business and Professions Code
22	section 4301 (p) in that while she was working as a pharmacy technician at Rite Aid # 6482
23	Respondent diverted and/or administered to herself controlled substances, which actions or
24	conduct would have warranted denial of a license. The circumstances are set forth above in
25	paragraph 15(b) and incorporated herein as though set forth fully herein.
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1	FIFTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE
2	(Unprofessional Conduct- Attempt to Unlawfully Possess a Controlled Substance)
3	19. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Business and Professions Code
4	section 4301 (o) in that while she was working as a pharmacy technician at Rite Aid # 6482,
5	Respondent engaged in unprofessional conduct by violating or attempting to violate, directly or
6	indirectly, any provision of the applicable federal and state laws and regulations governing
7	pharmacy, including regulations established by the Board, when she diverted and/or administered
8	to herself controlled substances from the pharmacy for self use. The circumstances are set forth
9	above in paragraph 15(b) and incorporated herein as though set forth fully herein.
10	SIXTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE
11	(Unprofessional Conduct- Unlawful Possession and
12	Administration of a Controlled Substance)
13	20. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Health and Safety Code
14	section 11170 and Business and Professions Code section 4060 in that while she was working as a
15	pharmacy technician at Rite Aid # 6482, Respondent diverted and/or administered to herself
16	controlled substances without a lawful prescription for self use. The circumstances are set forth
17	above in paragraph 15(b) and incorporated herein as though set forth fully herein.
18	<u>PRAYER</u>
19	WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged,
20	and that following the hearing, the Board of Pharmacy issue a decision:
21	1. Revoking or suspending Pharmacy Technician Registration Number TCH 116452,
22	issued to Michelle J. Caldera;
23	2. Ordering Michelle J. Caldera to pay the Board of Pharmacy the reasonable costs of
24	the investigation and enforcement of this case, pursuant to Business and Professions Code section
25	125.3;
