20	<u>PARTIES</u>										
21	1. Complainant brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity as the Executive										
22	Officer of the Board of Pharmacy, Department of Consumer Affairs.										
23	2. On or about January 31, 2003, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacy Technician										
24	Registration Number TCH 46913 to Tricia Marie Sporleder ("Respondent"). The Pharmacy										
25	Technician Registration was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the charges brought										
26	herein and will expire on September 30, 2014, unless renewed.										
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JURISDICTION

- 3. This Accusation is brought before the Board of Pharmacy ("Board"), Department of Consumer Affairs, under the authority of the following laws. All section references are to the Business and Professions Code ("Code") unless otherwise indicated.
 - Code section 4300 provides, in pertinent part: 4.
 - "(a) Every license issued may be suspended or revoked."

...

5. Code section 4300.1 provides, in pertinent part:

"The expiration, cancellation, forfeiture, or suspension of a board-issued license by operation of law or by order or decision of the board or a court of law, the placement of a license on a retired status, or the voluntary surrender of a license by a licensee shall not deprive the board of jurisdiction to commence or proceed with any investigation of, or action or disciplinary proceeding against, the licensee or to render a decision suspending or revoking the license."

STATUTORY PROVISIONS

Section 4060 of the Code states: 6.

"No person shall possess any controlled substance, except that furnished to a person upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor..."

7. Code section 4301 of the Code provides, in pertinent part:

"The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

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"(h) The administering to oneself, of any controlled substance, or the use of any dangerous drug or of alcoholic beverages to the extent or in a manner as to be dangerous or injurious to oneself, to a person holding a license under this chapter, or to any other person or to the public..."

"(1) The conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a licensee under this chapter..."

"(o) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or abetting the violation of or conspiring to violate any provision or term of this chapter or of the applicable federal and state laws and regulations governing pharmacy, including regulations established by the board or by any other state or federal regulatory agency."

COST RECOVERY

8. Code section 125.3 states, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of the case.

DRUGS

9. Diazepam ("Valium") is a Schedule IV controlled substance pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 11057, subdivision (d), and a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4022.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Conviction of Crime)

10. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Code section 4301, subdivision (*l*), for unprofessional conduct, in that Respondent was convicted of the following crime which is substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a licensed pharmacy technician: On or about October 25, 2013, in the case of *People v. Tricia Marie Sporleder* (Super Ct. San Joaquin County, Case No. ST061670A), Respondent was convicted by the Court on her plea of no contest of violating Vehicle Code section 23152, subdivision (b) (driving while having a blood alcohol content of .08% or higher), a misdemeanor. The facts and circumstances are as follows:

a. On or about July 6, 2013, Respondent drove a motor vehicle with a blood alcohol content (BAC) of .29%.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Dangerous Use of Alcohol)

11. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Code section 4301, subdivision (h), for unprofessional conduct, in that on or about July 6, 2013, Respondent used alcoholic beverages to an extent or in a manner dangerous or injurious to herself and the public when she operated a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, as more fully set forth above in paragraph 10 and its subpart.

THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unlawful Possession of Controlled Substance)

- 12. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Code section 4060 in that Respondent possessed a controlled substance without authorization or valid prescription thereof. The facts and circumstances are as follows:
- a. On or about July 6, 2013, an officer with the Lodi Police Department initiated a traffic stop for vehicle code violations on the vehicle Respondent was driving. During the officer's contact with Respondent, she admitted to the Officer that she had about three beers and a shot prior to driving because it was her friend's birthday. Based on Respondent's failure to perform Field Sobriety Tests satisfactorily, and the Officer's objective observations of Respondent's physical symptoms of intoxication, Respondent was arrested for driving while under the influence of alcohol and transported to the Lodi City Jail. During the search of Respondent's purse, an Officer located a prescription pill bottle for Codeine belonging to Respondent. In that bottle were several white pills that appeared to be Codeine, as well as several smaller yellow and orange pills. Respondent admitted to the Officer that the pills other than Codeine were Valium. She admitted that she does not have a prescription for Valium, and that they were given to her by her mother. Four of the pills were marked with "V" and "2632." Two of the pills were marked "5" and "5619." All six pills were later determined to be Diazepam (Valium).

FOURTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE
