20	2. On January 26, 1993, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacy Technician Registration	
21	No. TCH 3639 to Respondent Richard M. Antoniano. This Registration has been active at all	
22	times relevant to this pleading and expires on March 31, 2016, unless renewed.	
23	<u>JURISDICTION</u>	
24	3. This Accusation is brought before the E	Board under the authority of the following laws.
25	All section references are to the Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.	
26	4. Section 4300 provides, in pertinent part, that every license issued by the Board is	
27	subject to discipline, including suspension or revocation.	
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STATUTES

- 4. Section 490 provides that a board, including this one, may suspend or revoke a license or registration on the ground that the registrant has been convicted of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of the profession for which the registration was issued.
- 5. Section 4060 prohibits people from possessing any controlled substance without a prescription from a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or other authorized prescriber.
- 6. Section 4301 authorizes the Board to discipline any licensee who is guilty of unprofessional conduct and lists categories of unprofessional conduct:

"The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

(j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, or any other state, or of the United States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs.

(1) The conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a licensee under this chapter. The record of conviction of a violation of Chapter 13 (commencing with Section 801) of Title 21 of the United States Code regulating controlled substances or of a violation of the statutes of this state regulating controlled substances or dangerous drugs shall be conclusive evidence of unprofessional conduct. In all other cases, the record of conviction shall be conclusive evidence only of the fact that the conviction occurred. The board may inquire into the circumstances surrounding the commission of the crime, in order to fix the degree of discipline or, in the case of a conviction not involving controlled substances or dangerous drugs, to determine if the conviction is of an offense substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a licensee under this chapter. A plea or verdict of guilty or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere is deemed to be a conviction within the meaning of this provision. The board may take action when the time for appeal has elapsed, or the judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal or when an order granting probation is made suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code allowing the person to withdraw his or her plea of guilty and to enter a plea of not guilty, or setting aside the verdict of guilty, or dismissing the accusation, information, or indictment."

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BOARD REGULATIONS

7. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770 specifies when a criminal conviction is substantially related to a registrant's qualifications, functions or duties:

"For the purpose of denial, suspension, or revocation of a personal or facility license pursuant to Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475) of the Business and Professions Code, a crime or act shall be considered substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a licensee or registrant if to a substantial degree it evidences present or potential unfitness of a licensee or registrant to perform the functions authorized by his license or registration in a manner consistent with the public health, safety, or welfare."

COST RECOVERY

8. Section 125.3 authorizes the Board to an administrative law judge to direct a licensee found to have violated the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the case's reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement.

CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES

- 9. Cocaine is a Schedule II controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11055 subdivision (b)(6) and is categorized as a dangerous drug pursuant to section 4022.
- 10. Vicodin is the brand name for a combination of hydrocodone and acetaminophen. Hydrocodone is a Schedule II narcotic and an opiate as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11055, and Vicodin is a Schedule III controlled substance under Health and Safety Code section 11056, subdivision (e)(7) because it contains "[n]ot more than 500 milligrams of opium per 100 milliliters or per 100 grams or not more than 25 milligrams per dosage unit, with one or more active, nonnarcotic ingredients in recognized therapeutic amounts." As a prescription medication it is also categorized as a dangerous drug pursuant to section 4022.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Conviction of a Substantially Related Crime)

11. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under sections 4301, subdivision (l) and 490, in conjunction with California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, because he was convicted of felony possession of a controlled substance, a crime substantially related to a pharmacy technician's qualifications, functions or duties.

- 12. On January 10, 2014, Respondent pled nolo contendere to and was convicted of one felony count of violating Health and Safety Code section 11351 [possession of a controlled substance for sale] in the criminal proceeding entitled *People v. Richard Antoniano* (Super. Ct. L.A. County, 2014, No. VA125383). The Court sentenced Respondent to serve 1 day in Los Angeles County Jail and placed him on 3 years' probation.
- 13. The circumstances surrounding Respondent's conviction are that on June 1, 2012, Los Angeles County Sheriff's deputies responded to a call of a man with a gun at a business on Paramount Boulevard in Lakewood, California. They found two men who matched the suspect's description, one of whom was Respondent. They searched Respondent for weapons, but did not find a gun. They asked Respondent if his vehicle was there. He said yes, and consented to let them search his nearby Honda Accord. In his car, they found in plain view two orange unlabeled pill bottles containing 173 500 mg Vicodin pills, a bag containing six 750 mg Vicodin pills, a pack of small clear baggies, and a plastic bag containing an off white powdery substance that resembled and was later determined to be powder cocaine.
- 14. At the time he was arrested, Respondent did not have a prescription for Vicodin or for cocaine.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Possessing Controlled Substance Without a Prescription)

- 15. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under section 4301 subdivision (j) because he violated California statutes regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs, including (a) violating Business and Professions Code section 4040 by possessing Vicodin and cocaine without a prescription; and (b) violating Health and Safety Code section 11351 by his conviction for possession and sale of a controlled substance.
 - 16. Paragraphs 12 to 14 are realleged and incorporated into this cause for discipline.

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PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged, and that following the hearing, the Board of Pharmacy issue a decision:

- 1. Revoking or suspending Pharmacy Technician Registration No. TCH 3639, issued to Richard M. Antoniano;
- 2. Ordering Richard M. Antoniano to pay the Board of Pharmacy this case's reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement under Business and Professions Code section 125.3; and
 - 3. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
