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17	Complainant alleges:
18	PARTIES
19	1. Virginia Herold ("Complainant") brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity
20	as the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy, Department of Consumer Affairs ("Board").
21	2. On or about June 25, 2012, the Board issued Pharmacy Technician Registration No.
22	TCH 124325 to Patty Adriana Dribon ("Respondent"). The Pharmacy Technician Registration
23	expired on November 30, 2013, and has not been renewed.
24	JURISDICTION
25	3. This Accusation is brought before the Board the authority of the following laws. All
26	section references are to the Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.
27	4. Section 4300 provides in pertinent part, that every license issued by the Boards is
28	subject to discipline, including suspension or revocation.
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	Accusation

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Section 4300.1 states:

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"The expiration, cancellation, forfeiture, or suspension of a board-issued license by
operation of law or by order or decision of the board or a court of law, the placement of a license
on a retired status, or the voluntary surrender of a license by a licensee shall not deprive the board
of jurisdiction to commence or proceed with any investigation of, or action or disciplinary
proceeding against, the licensee or to render a decision suspending or revoking the license."

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#### **STATUTORY PROVISIONS**

6. Section 490 states, in pertinent part:

9 "(a) In addition to any other action that a board is permitted to take against a licensee, a 10 board may suspend or revoke a license on the ground that the licensee has been convicted of a 11 crime, if the crime is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of the business 12 or profession for which the license was issued.

"(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a board may exercise any authority to
discipline a licensee for conviction of a crime that is independent of the authority granted under
subdivision (a) only if the crime is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties
of the business or profession for which the licensee's license was issued.

"(c) A conviction within the meaning of this section means a plea or verdict of guilty or a
conviction following a plea of nolo contendere. Any action that a board is permitted to take
following the establishment of a conviction may be taken when the time for appeal has elapsed, or
the judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal, or when an order granting probation is
made suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under the
provisions of Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code."

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7. Section 4060 states:

"A person shall not possess any controlled substance, except that furnished to a person
upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic
doctor pursuant to Section 3640.7, or furnished pursuant to a drug order issued by a certified
nurse-midwife pursuant to Section 2746.51, a nurse practitioner pursuant to Section 2836.1, a
physician assistant pursuant to Section 3502.1, a naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.5,

or a pharmacist pursuant to either Section 4052.1 or 4052.2. This section does not apply to the
 possession of any controlled substance by a manufacturer, wholesaler, pharmacy, pharmacist,
 physician, podiatrist, dentist, optometrist, veterinarian, naturopathic doctor, certified nurse midwife, nurse practitioner, or physician assistant, if in stock in containers correctly labeled with
 the name and address of the supplier or producer."

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Section 4301 states, in pertinent part:

"The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

"(j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, or any other state, or of the United
States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs.

The conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and 14 "(1) duties of a licensee under this chapter. The record of conviction of a violation of Chapter 13 15 16 (commencing with Section 801) of Title 21 of the United States Code regulating controlled substances or of a violation of the statutes of this state regulating controlled substances or 17 dangerous drugs shall be conclusive evidence of unprofessional conduct. In all other cases, the 18 19 record of conviction shall be conclusive evidence only of the fact that the conviction occurred. The board may inquire into the circumstances surrounding the commission of the crime, in order 20 to fix the degree of discipline or, in the case of a conviction not involving controlled substances 21 or dangerous drugs, to determine if the conviction is of an offense substantially related to the 22 qualifications, functions, and duties of a licensee under this chapter. A plea or verdict of guilty or 23 a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere is deemed to be a conviction within the meaning 24 of this provision. The board may take action when the time for appeal has elapsed, or the 25 judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal or when an order granting probation is made 26suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under Section 1203.4 of 27 the Penal Code allowing the person to withdraw his or her plea of guilty and to enter a plea of not 28

guilty, or setting aside the verdict of guilty, or dismissing the accusation, information, or indictment.

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"(o) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or abetting the violation of or conspiring to violate any provision or term of this chapter or of the applicable federal and state laws and regulations governing pharmacy, including regulations established by the board or by any other state or federal regulatory agency."

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Health and Safety Code section 11350, subdivision (a), states:

"Except as otherwise provided in this division, every person who possesses (1) any 9 controlled substance specified in subdivision (b) or (c), or paragraph (1) of subdivision (f) of 10 Section 11054, specified in paragraph (14), (15), or (20) of subdivision (d) of Section 11054, or 11 specified in subdivision (b) or (c) of Section 11055, or specified in subdivision (h) of Section 12 11056, or (2) any controlled substance classified in Schedule III, IV, or V which is a narcotic 13 drug, unless upon the written prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, or veterinarian 14 licensed to practice in this state, shall be punished by imprisonment pursuant to subdivision (h) of 15 Section 1170 of the Penal Code." 16

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# **REGULATORY PROVISIONS**

10. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, states:

"For the purpose of denial, suspension, or revocation of a personal or facility license
pursuant to Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475) of the Business and Professions Code, a
crime or act shall be considered substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a
licensee or registrant if to a substantial degree it evidences present or potential unfitness of a
licensee or registrant to perform the functions authorized by his license or registration in a manner
consistent with the public health, safety, or welfare."

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# COST RECOVERY

26 11. Section 125.3 states, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the administrative
27 law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of the licensing

act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of the 1 case. 2 **CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES** 3 12. "Cocaine," is a Schedule II controlled substance as defined in Health and Safety 4 Code section 11055, subdivision (b)(6), and "Cocaine base" is a Schedule I controlled substance 5 as defined in Health and Safety Code section 11054, subdivision (f)(1). It is categorized as a 6 dangerous drug according to section 4022. 7 "Heroin," is a Schedule I controlled substance as defined in Health and Safety Code 13. 8 section 11054, subdivision (c)(11), and is categorized as a dangerous drug pursuant to section 9 4022. 10 14. "Methamphetamine," is a Schedule II controlled substance as defined in Health and 11 Safety Code section 11055, subdivision (d)(2), and is categorized as a dangerous drug pursuant to 12 13 section 4022. 15. "Oxycodone," is a Schedule II controlled substance as defined in Health and Safety 14 Code section 11055, subdivision (b)(1)(M), and is categorized as a dangerous drug pursuant to 15 section 4022. 16 "Xanax," a brand name for Alprazolam, is a Schedule IV controlled substance as 16. 17 defined in Health and Safety Code section 11057, subdivision (d)(1), and is categorized as a 18 19 dangerous drug pursuant to section 4022. FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE 20(Conviction of a Substantially Related Crime) 21 17. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under section 4301, subdivision (1), and 22 section 490, in conjunction with California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, in that 23 Respondent was convicted of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and 24 duties of a pharmacy technician, as follows: 25 On or about October 29, 2013, after pleading guilty, Respondent was convicted of a. 26 one felony count of violating Health and Safety Code section 11378 [possession of a controlled 27 substance for sale] and one felony count of violating section Health and Safety Code 11379, 28

subdivision (a) [sale/offer to sell/transportation of a controlled substance], in the criminal
 proceeding entitled *The People of the State of California v. Patty Adriana Dribon* (Super. Ct. Los
 Angeles County, 2013, No. BA417716). The Court sentenced Respondent to serve 270 days in
 Los Angeles County Jail and placed her on formal probation for three (3) years.

b. The circumstances surrounding the conviction are that on or about October 23, 2013,
Los Angeles Police Department officers initiated a traffic stop and asked the driver and the
Respondent to exit the vehicle. During an interview with the Respondent, an officer observed a
plastic baggy in Respondent's boot. The officer retrieved the baggy and found a large amount of
a substance that appeared to be Methamphetamine. During a search of the vehicle, officers also
found a bag containing a large amount of Methamphetamine, cocaine, tar heroin, oxycodone and
a glass vial of yellow pills resembling Xanax, along with many empty baggies.

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# SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

#### (Possession of Controlled Substances)

14 18. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under section 4301, subdivisions (j) and
15 (o), for violating section 4060 and Health and Safety Code section 11350, subdivision (a), in that
16 Respondent was found to be in illegal possession of controlled substances. Complainant refers to,
17 and by this reference incorporates, the allegations set forth above in paragraph 17, subparagraphs
18 (a) and (b) inclusive, as though set forth fully.

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# THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Violation of the Pharmacy Law)

19. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under section 4301, subdivision (o), in
that Respondent violated provisions of the Pharmacy Law. Complainant refers to, and by this
reference incorporates, the allegations set forth above in paragraphs 17 and 18, inclusive, as
though set forth fully.

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# <u>PRAYER</u>

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged,
and that following the hearing, the Board issue a decision:

Revoking or suspending Pharmacy Technician Registration No. TCH 124325, issued 1. 1 to Patty Adriana Dribon; 2 2. Ordering Patty Adriana Dribon to pay the Board the reasonable costs of the 3 investigation and enforcement of this case, pursuant to section 125.3; and, 4 3.
