20	1. Virginia Herold (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity as		
21	the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy (Board), Department of Consumer Affairs.		
22	2. On or about February 25, 1994, the Board issued Pharmacy Technician Registration		
23	No. TCH 11868 to Nilsa Maria Gamboa (Respondent). The Pharmacy Technician Registration		
24	was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the charges brought herein and will expire on		
25	March 31, 2017, unless renewed.

27	3. This Accusation is brought before the Board under the authority of the following laws

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JURISDICTION

- 4. This Accusation is brought before the Board under the authority of the following laws.

 All section references are to the Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.
- 5. Section 4300 provides in pertinent part, that every license issued by the Boards is subject to discipline, including suspension or revocation.
 - 6. Section 4300.1 states:

"The expiration, cancellation, forfeiture, or suspension of a board-issued license by operation of law or by order or decision of the board or a court of law, the placement of a license on a retired status, or the voluntary surrender of a license by a licensee shall not deprive the board of jurisdiction to commence or proceed with any investigation of, or action or disciplinary proceeding against, the licensee or to render a decision suspending or revoking the license."

STATUTORY AND REGULATORY PROVISIONS

7. Section 4301 states, in pertinent part:

"The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

"(f) The commission of any act involving moral turpitude, dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or corruption, whether the act is committed in the course of relations as a licensee or otherwise, and whether the act is a felony or misdemeanor or not.

"(I) The conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a licensee under this chapter. The record of conviction of a violation of Chapter 13 (commencing with Section 801) of Title 21 of the United States Code regulating controlled substances or of a violation of the statutes of this state regulating controlled substances or dangerous drugs shall be conclusive evidence of unprofessional conduct. In all other cases, the record of conviction shall be conclusive evidence only of the fact that the conviction occurred. The board may inquire into the circumstances surrounding the commission of the crime, in order to

 fix the degree of discipline or, in the case of a conviction not involving controlled substances or dangerous drugs, to determine if the conviction is of an offense substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a licensee under this chapter. A plea or verdict of guilty or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere is deemed to be a conviction within the meaning of this provision. The board may take action when the time for appeal has elapsed, or the judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal or when an order granting probation is made suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code allowing the person to withdraw his or her plea of guilty and to enter a plea of not guilty, or setting aside the verdict of guilty, or dismissing the accusation, information, or indictment."

8. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, states:

"For the purpose of denial, suspension, or revocation of a personal or facility license pursuant to Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475) of the Business and Professions Code, a crime or act shall be considered substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a licensee or registrant if to a substantial degree it evidences present or potential unfitness of a licensee or registrant to perform the functions authorized by his license or registration in a manner consistent with the public health, safety, or welfare."

COST RECOVERY

9. Section 125.3 provides, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of the case, with failure of the licentiate to comply subjecting the license to not being renewed or reinstated. If a case settles, recovery of investigation and enforcement costs may be included in a stipulated settlement.

10. <u>DANGEROUS DRUGS</u>

a. "Albuterol," is used to dilate the airways of the lung and is used for treating asthma and other conditions of the lung. It is categorized as a dangerous drug within the meaning of section 4022.

- b. "Hydroxyzine Pamoate," is an antihistamine with anticholinergic and sedative properties used as a sedative to treat anxiety and tension. It is a prescription drug and considered a dangerous drug pursuant to section 4022.
- c. "Loratadine," is used to temporarily relieve symptoms due to hay fever or other upper respiratory allergies. It is categorized as a dangerous drug within the meaning of section 4022.
- d. "Prednisone," is a corticosteroid used to treat severe allergies, arthritis, asthma, and skin conditions. It is categorized as a dangerous drug within the meaning of section 4022.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Conviction of a Substantially Related Crime)

- 11. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under sections 4301, subdivision (l), in conjunction with California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, in that, Respondent was convicted of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a pharmacy technician as follows:
- a. On or about November 19, 2014, Respondent was convicted of one misdemeanor count of violating Penal Code section 496, subdivision (a) [receiving stolen property] in the criminal proceeding entitled *The People of the State of California v. Nilsa Maria Gamboa* (Super. Ct. L.A. County, 2014, No. NA099132-04). The Court sentenced Respondent to serve 2 days in Los Angeles County jail and placed her on 3 years probation, with terms and conditions.
- b. The circumstances surrounding the conviction are that on or between 2010 and 2014 while working as a supervisor at the Veterans Affairs Hospital in Long Beach, Respondent received medications including loratedine, albuterol, prednisone, and hydroxyzine pamoate, from another employee for her personal use.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Acts Involving Dishonesty, Fraud, Deceit, or Corruption

12. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under section 4301, subdivision (f), in that on or between 2010 and 2014, Respondent committed acts involving dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or corruption with the intent to substantially benefit herself, or substantially injure another.

4	WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged,

7	Nilsa Maria Gamboa;	
8	2. Ordering Nilsa Maria Gamboa to pay the Board the reasonable costs of the	
9	investigation and enforcement of this case, pursuant to section 125.3; and	
10	3. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
