22	the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy, Department of Consumer Affairs.		
23	2. On or about August 18, 2011, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacy Technician		
24	Registration Number TCH 113716 to Jessica M. Ureta, who is also known as Jessica Mendaros		
25	Ureta (Respondent). The Pharmacy Technician Registration was in full force and effect at all		
26	times relevant to the charges brought herein and will expire on October 31, 2016, unless renewed.

1	JURISDICTION	
2	3. This Accusation is brought before the Board of Pharmacy (Board), Department of	
3	Consumer Affairs, under the authority of the following laws. All section references are to the	
4	Business and Professions Code (Code) unless otherwise indicated.	
5	4. Section 4300, subdivision (a) of the Code states "Every license issued may be	
6	suspended or revoked."	
7	5. Section 4300.1 of the Code states:	
8	The expiration, cancellation, forfeiture, or suspension of a board-issued license by	
9	deprive the board of jurisdiction to commence or proceed with any investigation of, or

12	STATUTORY PROVISIONS	
13	6. Section 4022 of the Code states	
14 15	self-use in humans or animals, and includes the following:	
16	(a) Any drug that bears the legend: "Caution: federal law prohibits dispensing without prescription," "Rx only," or words of similar import.	
17 18 19	(b) Any device that bears the statement: "Caution: federal law restricts this device to sale by or on the order of a," "Rx only," or words of similar import, the blank to be filled in with the designation of the practitioner licensed to use or order use of the device.	
20	(c) Any other drug or device that by federal or state law can be lawfully dispensed only on prescription or furnished pursuant to Section 4006.	
21	7. Section 4060 of the Code states, in pertinent part, that no person shall possess any	
22	controlled substance, except that furnished to a person upon the prescription of a physician,	
23	dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor.	
24	8. Health and Safety Code section 11364, subdivision (a) provides, in pertinent part, that	
25	it is unlawful to possess an opium pipe or any device, contrivance, instrument, or paraphernalia	
26	used for unlawfully injecting or smoking a controlled substance.

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1	9. Health and Safety Code section 11377, subdivision (a) provides, in pertinent part, that	
2	every person who possesses the controlled substance methamphetamine shall be punished by	
3	imprisonment in a county jail for a period of not more than one year (misdemeanor offense).	
4	10. Section 4301 of the Code states:	
5	The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of	
6 7	unprofessional conduct or whose license has been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:	
8	(j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, or any other state, or of the United States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs	
9	11. Section 492 of the Code states:	
10	Notwithstanding any other provision of law, successful completion of any diversion	
11	program under the Penal Code, or successful completion of an alcohol and drug problem assessment program under Article 5 (commencing with section 23249.50) of Chapter 12 of Division 11 of the Vehicle Code, shall not prohibit any agency established under Division 2 ([Healing Arts] commencing with Section 500) of this code, or any initiative act referred to in that division, from taking disciplinary action against a licensee or from denying a license for professional misconduct, notwithstanding that evidence of that misconduct may be recorded in a record pertaining to an arrest.

14	This section shall not be construed to apply to any drug diversion program operated	
15 16	by any agency established under Division 2 (commencing with Section 500) of this code, or any initiative act referred to in that division.	
17	COSTS	
18	12. Section 125.3 of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the	
19	administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of	
20	the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and	
21	enforcement of the case, with failure of the licentiate to comply subjecting the license to not being	
22	renewed or reinstated. If a case settles, recovery of investigation and enforcement costs may be	
23	included in a stipulated settlement.

25	13. Methamphetamine is a Schedule II controlled substance as designated by Health	
26	and Safety Code section 11055, subdivision (d)(2), and is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business	
27	and Professions Code section 4022.

CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

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(Violation of California Statutes Regulating Controlled Substances)

14. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under section 4301, subdivision (j) of the Code for unprofessional conduct in that on or about February 24, 2015, she violated Business and Professions Code sections 4060, and Health and Safety Code sections 11373, subdivision (a), and 11364, subdivision (a). The circumstances are as follows:

On or about the morning of February 24, 2015, two patrol officers with the La a. 7. Palma Police Department were investigating citizen reports of suspicious activity in a 8 9 neighborhood. The officers observed a parked vehicle with two occupants. As the officers approached the vehicle, they observed Respondent slumped in the passenger seat; she appeared to 10 be passed out. The officers spoke to the male driver (Respondent's boyfriend), during which time 11 Respondent woke up. After finding illegal drugs on Respondent's boyfriend, the officers then 12 spoke with Respondent. During a consent search of her person, the officer located a small baggie 13 containing methamphetamine, and a capped, unused syringe in her jacket pocket. During a search 14 of Respondent's vehicle, the officers found an additional baggie of methamphetamine on the 15 driver's seat, a small amount of what the officer believed to be heroin, and a piece of folded 16 aluminum foil with burnt marks indicative of a device used to smoke heroin. The officer also 17 found a water bottle with a false bottom that contained two unidentified pills. Inside Respondent's 18 carry bag, the officer found a glass smoking pipe containing a white, chalky residue. Additional 19 prescription drugs were found in the backpack of Respondent's boyfriend. Both were arrested and 20 booked. During questioning, Respondent told officers she recently started using 21 methamphetamine, and had been introduced to heroin in the previous couple of months. 22

b. As a result of the arrest, in criminal proceedings entitled *People of the State of California vs. Jessica Mendaros Ureta, et al.*, the Orange County District Attorney's Office filed
charges against Respondent on May 19, 2015 alleging violations of Health and Safety Code
section 11377, subdivision (a) – possession of methamphetamine; and Health and Safety Code
section 11364, subdivision (a) – possession of controlled substance paraphernalia. Respondent
failed to appear at her June 19, 2015 arraignment on the charges.

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1	PRAYER	
2	WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged,	
3	and that following the hearing, the Board of Pharmacy issue a decision:	
4	1. Revoking or suspending Pharmacy Technician Registration Number TCH 113716,	
5	issued to Jessica M. Ureta, also known as Jessica Mendaros Ureta;	
6	2. Ordering Jessica M. Ureta to pay the Board of Pharmacy the reasonable costs of the	
7	investigation and enforcement of this case, pursuant to Business and Professions Code section	
8	125.3;	
9	3. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
