4	3. On or about March 5, 1992, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacist License		
5	Number RPH 45022 to El Sayed B. A. Hamouda, aka El Sayed Ahmed Hamouda (Respondent		
6	Hamouda). The Pharmacist License was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the		
7	charges brought herein and will expire on January 31, 2018, unless renewed.		
8	JURISDICTION		
9	4. This Accusation is brought before the California State Board of Pharmacy (Board),		
10	Department of Consumer Affairs, under the authority of the following laws. All section		
11	references are to the Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.		
12	5. Section 4300 of the Code provides, in part, that every license issued by the Board		
13	is subject to discipline, including suspension or revocation.		
14	6. Section 4302 of the Code states:		
15	"The board may deny, suspend, or revoke any license of a corporation where conditions		
16	exist in relation to any person holding 10 percent or more of the corporate stock of the		
17	corporation, or where conditions exist in relation to any officer or director of the corporation that		
18	would constitute grounds for disciplinary action against a licensee."		
19	7. Section 4113 of the Code states, in part:		
20	"(b) The pharmacist-in-charge shall be responsible for a pharmacy's compliance with all		
21	state and federal laws and regulations pertaining to the practice of pharmacy."		
22	8. Section 118, subdivision (b), of the Code provides that the suspension, expiration,		
23	surrender, or cancellation of a license shall not deprive the Board of jurisdiction to proceed with a		
24	disciplinary action during the period within which the license may be renewed, restored, reissued		
25	or reinstated.

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1	STATUTORY AUTHORITY		
2	9. Section 4301 of the Code states, in part:		
3	"The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional		
4	conduct Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:		
5			
6	"(d) The clearly excessive furnishing of controlled substances in violation of subdivision		
7	(a) of Section 11153 of the Health and Safety Code.		
8			
9	"(j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, or any other state, or of the United		
10	States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs.		
11			
12	"(o) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or abetting the		
13	violation of or conspiring to violate any provision or term of this chapter or of the applicable		
14	federal and state laws and regulations governing pharmacy, including regulations established by		
15	the board or by any other state or federal regulatory agency."		
16	10. Section 4306.5 of the Code states:		
17	"Unprofessional conduct for a pharmacist may include any of the following:		
18	"(a) Acts or omissions that involve, in whole or in part, the inappropriate exercise of his		
19	or her education, training, or experience as a pharmacist, whether or not the act or omission arises		
20	in the course of the practice of pharmacy or the ownership, management, administration, or		
21	operation of a pharmacy or other entity licensed by the board.		
22	"(b) Acts or omissions that involve, in whole or in part, the failure to exercise or		
23	implement his or her best professional judgment or corresponding responsibility with regard to		
24	the dispensing or furnishing of controlled substances, dangerous drugs, or dangerous devices, or		
25	with regard to the provision of services.		
26	"(c) Acts or omissions that involve, in whole or in part, the failure to consult appropriate		
27	patient, prescription, and other records pertaining to the performance of any pharmacy function.		
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"(d) Acts or omissions that involve, in whole or in part, the failure to fully maintain and
 retain appropriate patient-specific information pertaining to the performance of any pharmacy
 function."

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12. Section 4307, subdivision (a), of the Code states that:

"Any person who has been denied a license or whose license has been revoked or is under 5 suspension, or who has failed to renew his or her license while it was under suspension, or who 6 has been a manager, administrator, owner member, officer, director, associate, or partner of any 7 partnership, corporation, firm, or association whose application for a license has been denied or 8 revoked, is under suspension or has been placed on probation, and while acting as the manger. 9 administrator, owner, member, officer, director, associate, or partner had knowledge or knowingly 10 participated in any conduct for which the license was denied, revoked, suspended, or placed on 11 probation, shall be prohibited from serving as a manger, administrator, owner, member, officer, 12 director, associate, or partner of a licensee as follows: 13

(1) Where a probationary license is issued or where an existing license is placed on
probation, this prohibition shall remain in effect for a period not to exceed five years.

16 (2) Where the license is denied or revoked, the prohibition shall continue until the
17 license is issued or reinstated."

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# STATE REGULATORY AUTHORITY

11. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1707.3 states:

20 "Prior to consultation as set forth in section 1707.2, a pharmacist shall review a patient's
21 drug therapy and medication record before each prescription drug is delivered. The review shall
22 include screening for severe potential drug therapy problems."

23

12. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1718 states:

24 "Current Inventory' as used in Sections 4081 and 4332 of the Business and Professions
25 Code shall be considered to include complete accountability for all dangerous drugs handled by
26 every licensee enumerated in Sections 4081 and 4332.

27 The controlled substances inventories required by Title 21, CFR, Section 1304 shall be
28 available for inspection upon request for at least 3 years after the date of the inventory."

13. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1761 states, in part:

"(a) No pharmacist shall compound or dispense any prescription which contains any
significant error, omission, irregularity, uncertainty, ambiguity or alteration. Upon receipt of any
such prescription, the pharmacist shall contact the prescriber to obtain the information needed to
validate the prescription.

6 "(b) Even after conferring with the prescriber, a pharmacist shall not compound or
7 dispense a controlled substance prescription where the pharmacist knows or has objective reason
8 to know that said prescription was not issued for a legitimate medical purpose."

# HEALTH AND SAFETY CODES

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14. Health and Safety Code section 11153 states, in part:

"(a) A prescription for a controlled substance shall only be issued for a legitimate medical 11 purpose by an individual practitioner acting in the usual course of his or her professional practice. 12 13 The responsibility for the proper prescribing and dispensing of controlled substances is upon the prescribing practitioner, but a corresponding responsibility rests with the pharmacist who fills the 14 prescription. Except as authorized by this division, the following are not legal prescriptions: (1) 15 an order purporting to be a prescription which is issued not in the usual course of professional 16 treatment or in legitimate and authorized research; or (2) an order for an addict or habitual user of 17 controlled substances, which is issued not in the course of professional treatment or as part of an 18 19 authorized narcotic treatment program, for the purpose of providing the user with controlled substances, sufficient to keep him or her comfortable by maintaining customary use." 20

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15. Health and Safety Code Section 11162.1 states, in part:

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1	Justice (b) Each batch of controlled substance prescription forms shall have the lot number	
2	printed on the form and each form within that batch shall be numbered sequentially beginning	
3	with the numeral one."	
4	16. Health and Safety Code Section 11164 states, in part:	
5	"[N]o person shall prescribe a controlled substance, nor shall any person fill, compound, or	
6	dispense a prescription for a controlled substance, unless it complies with the requirements of this	
7	section. (a) Each prescription for a controlled substance shall be made on a controlled	
8	substance prescription form as specified in Section 11162.1."	
9	FEDERAL REGULATIONS	
10	17. Code of Federal Regulations, title 21, section 1304.11, states, in pertinent part:	
11	"b. Initial inventory date. Every person required to keep records shall take an inventory of	
12	all stocks of controlled substances on hand on the date he/she first engages in the manufacture,	
13	distribution, or dispensing of controlled substances, in accordance with paragraph (e) of this	
14	section as applicable. In the event a person commences business with no controlled substances on	
15	hand, he/she shall record this fact as the initial inventory.	
16	"c. Biennial inventory date. After the initial inventory is taken, the registrant shall take a	
17	new inventory of all stocks of controlled substances on hand at least every two years. The biennial	
18	inventory may be taken on any date which is within two years of the previous biennial inventory	
19	date."	
20	COST RECOVERY	
21	18. Section 125.3 of the Code provides, in part, that the Board may request the	
22	administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of	
23	the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and	
24	enforcement of the case.

Dr. H.A., an obstetrician/gynecologist, prescribing alprazolam 2 mg tablets ii. more than any other medication without prescribing oral contraceptives or vaginal antibiotics or antifungals.

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ii. Dr. H.P., a surgeon, prescribing alprazolam 2 mg tablets for all of his patients.

f. The prescribing profiles for the listed practitioners containing almost exclusively the 7 highest available doses of the medications. Drs. Garg, C.P., H.A., S.S., H.P., H.F., and S.J. 8 prescribed large quantities of alprazolam 2 mg tablets and oxycodone 30 mg tablets without 9 prescribing any lower strengths of alprazolam and oxycodone. 10

The dispensing histories of many patients consisting only of controlled substances, 11 g. purchased in cash, and written by prescribers from out of the pharmacy's normal trade area. 12

Respondent Pharmacy did not have any records of verification for the prescriptions h. 13 identified in the documents that were collected during the Board's inspection. 14

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## SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

# (Required Forms for Controlled Substance Prescriptions)

22. Respondent Pharmacy and Respondent Hamouda are subject to discipline pursuant to 17Code sections 4301, subdivision (j) and (o), and 4113, on the grounds of unprofessional conduct, 18 by filling prescriptions that were not written on controlled substance prescription forms as 19 specified in Health and Safety Code Section 11162.1, in violation of Health and Safety Code 20 Section 11164. Specifically, between January 24, 2013, and May 11, 2015, Respondent 21 Pharmacy filled at least 53 prescriptions under the prescribing authority of Drs. R.G., H.A., A.W., 22 E.H., C.P., C.O., D.H., and PA L.L. pursuant to prescriptions written on forms that did not 23 comply with the requirements of Health and Safety Code Section 11162.1. The prescription 24 forms lacked a watermark consisting of the words "California Security Prescription", a feature 25 printed in thermochromic ink, and an identifying number assigned to the security printer by the 26 Department of Justice, and other requirements. 27

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1	THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE	
2	(Failure to Conduct DEA Biennial Inventory)	
3	23. Respondent Pharmacy and Respondent Hamouda are subject to discipline pursuant to	
4	Code sections 4301, subdivision (o), and 4113, on the grounds of unprofessional conduct, in that	
5	they violated Code of Federal Regulations, title 21, section 1304.11 and California Code of	
6	Regulations, title 16, section 1718, by failing to conduct the Drug Enforcement Administration	
7	(DEA) biennial inventory of controlled substances as required. Specifically, on or about June 12,	
8	2015, during a Board inspection of Respondent Pharmacy's facility, located at 1415 Rosamond	
9	Boulevard, Suite 22, Rosamond, California, the Board inspector found that the most recent DEA	
10	biennial inventory of controlled substances completed by Respondent Hamouda was in January	
11	2013.	
12	FOURTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE	
13	(Unprofessional Conduct)	
14	24. Respondent Pharmacy and Respondent Hamouda are subject to discipline pursuant	
15	to Code sections 4301 and 4113, in that Respondents committed unprofessional conduct, as more	
16	fully discussed in paragraphs 20 through 23, above.	
17	OTHER MATTERS	
18	25. Pursuant to Code section 4307, if discipline is imposed on Pharmacy Permit Number	
19	PHY 46967 issued to El Sayed B. A. Hamouda, aka El Sayed Ahmed Hamouda dba Rosamond	
20	Pharmacy, while El Sayed B. A. Hamouda, aka El Sayed Ahmed Hamouda has been an officer	
21	and owner and had knowledge of or knowingly participated in any conduct for which the licensee	
22	was disciplined, El Sayed B. A. Hamouda, aka El Sayed Ahmed Hamouda shall be prohibited	
23	from serving as a manager, administrator, owner, member, officer, director, associate, or partner	
24	of a licensee for five years if Pharmacy Permit Number PHY 46967 is placed on probation or	
25	until Pharmacy Permit Number PHY 46967 is reinstated if it is revoked.

2	26. To determine the degree of discipline, if any, to be imposed on Respondent Pharmacy,
3	Complainant alleges that on or about November 2, 2011, in a prior action, the Board of Pharmacy
4	issued Citation Number CI 2009 44516 to Respondent Pharmacy and ordered it to pay a fine of
5	\$3,350, for violating Code section 4125 and California Code of Regulations, title 16, sections
6	1715, subdivision (a), 1793.7, subdivision (c), 1793.7, subdivision (a), 1716, and 1711,
7	subdivisions (d) and (e) and 21 Code of Federal Regulations section 1306.22, subdivision (b).
8	That Citation is now final and is incorporated by reference as if fully set forth. The Citation has
9	been paid in full.
10	27. To determine the degree of discipline, if any, to be imposed on Respondent Hamouda,
11	Complainant alleges that on or about November 2, 2011, in a prior action, the Board of Pharmacy
12	issued Citation Number CI 20011 49809 to Respondent Hamouda and ordered him to pay a fine
13	of \$5,250, for violating Code section 4125 and California Code of Regulations, title 16, sections
14	1715, subdivision (a), 1793.7, subdivision (c), 1793.7, subdivision (a), 1716, and 1711,
15	subdivisions (d) and (e) and 21 Code of Federal Regulations section 1306.22, subdivision (b).
16	That Citation is now final and is incorporated by reference as if fully set forth. The Citation has
17	been paid in full.

1	PRAYER
2	WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged,
3	and that following the hearing, the Board of Pharmacy issue a decision:
4	1. Revoking or suspending Pharmacy Permit License Number PHY 46967, issued to El
5	Sayed B. A. Hamouda, aka El Sayed Ahmed Hamouda dba Rosamond Pharmacy;
6	2. Revoking or suspending Pharmacist License Number RPH 45022, issued to El Sayed
7	B. A. Hamouda, aka El Sayed Ahmed Hamouda;
8	3. Prohibiting El Sayed B. A. Hamouda, aka El Sayed Ahmed Hamouda from serving as
9	a manager, administrator, owner, member, officer, director, associate, or partner of a licensee for
10	five years if Pharmacy Permit Number PHY 46967 is placed on probation or until Pharmacy
11	Permit Number PHY 46967 is reinstated if Pharmacy Permit Number 50434 issued to El Sayed B.
12	A. Hamouda, aka El Sayed Ahmed Hamouda dba Rosamond Pharmacy is revoked;
13	4. Ordering El Sayed Ahmed Hamouda to pay the Board of Pharmacy the reasonable
14	costs of the investigation and enforcement of this case, pursuant to Business and Professions Code
15	section 125.3;
16	5. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
