I	1 A	Accusation Against Gloria Patricia Godoy (Case No. 5900)

JURISDICTION

3. This Accusation is brought before Board under the authority of the following laws.

All section references are to the Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.

- 4. Code section 4300 provides in pertinent part that "[e]very license issued may be suspended or revoked."
 - 5. Code section 4300.1 states:

The expiration, cancellation, forfeiture, or suspension of a board-issued license by operation of law or by order or decision of the board or a court of law, the placement of a license on a retired status, or the voluntary surrender of a license by a licensee shall not deprive the board of jurisdiction to commence or proceed with any investigation of, or action or disciplinary proceeding against, the licensee or to render a decision suspending or revoking the license.

STATUTES

- 6. Code section 4022 defines "dangerous drug" to mean any drug that is "unsafe for selfuse in humans or animals."
 - 7. Code section 4301 provides in pertinent part:

The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

- (f) The commission of any act involving moral turpitude, dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or corruption, whether the act is committed in the course of relations as a licensee or otherwise, and whether the act is a felony or misdemeanor or not.
- (g) Knowingly making or signing any certificate or other document that falsely represents the existence or nonexistence of a state of facts.
- (j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, of any other state, or of the United States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs.
- (o) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or abetting the violation of or conspiring to violate any provision or term of this chapter or of the applicable federal and state laws and regulations governing pharmacy, including regulations established by the board or by any other state or federal regulatory agency.

1	8. Code section 4324 states:	
2	(a) Every person who signs the name of another, or of a fictitious person, or	
3	falsely makes, alters, forges, utters, publishes, passes, or attempts to pass, as genuine, any prescription for any drugs is guilty of forgery and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment pursuant to subdivision (h) of Section 1170 of the Penal Code, or by imprisonment in a county jail for not more than one year.

9	9. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, states:	
10	For the purpose of denial, suspension, or revocation of a personal or facility license pursuant to Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475) of the Business and	
11	Professions Code, a crime or act shall be considered substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a licensee or registrant if to a substantial degree it	
12	evidences present or potential unfitness of a licensee or registrant to perform the functions authorized by his license or registration in a manner consistent with the

15	10. Code section 125.3 provides in pertinent part that the Board may request the	
16	administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of	
17	the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and	
18	enforcement of the case, with failure of the licentiate to comply subjecting the license to not being	
19	renewed or reinstated.	
20	DRUG CLASSIFICATIONS	
21	11. Combigan is a dangerous drug approved for reducing elevated intraocular pressure in	
22	patients with glaucoma. (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4022.)	
23	STATEMENT OF FACTS	
24	12. On or about September 10, 2013, Respondent, while working as a Pharmacy	
25	Technician at a CVS retail pharmacy in Sun Valley, California, wrote a refill authorization for her	
26	family member's prescription of Combigan eye drops without the doctor's authorization.	
27	13. Respondent wrote on the refill authorization form that "Maria" approved three refills,	
28	but Respondent never spoke with anyone in the doctor's office, let alone "Maria." Respondent

knew that the refills had not been approved by any person authorized to prescribe dangerous drugs when she wrote the refill prescription and, later, when she submitted it to the pharmacist to be dispensed.

- 14. Relying on the forged refill prescription, the pharmacist dispensed the medication on or about September 10, 2013. Respondent picked up the Combigan eye drops and signed for them on behalf of her family member.
- 15. Respondent admitted in a written statement that she forged the prescription refill authorization.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Falsification of a Document)

16. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Code section 4301, subdivision (g), in conjunction with California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, for unprofessional conduct in that she knowingly made or signed a document that falsely represented the existence or nonexistence of a state of facts: to wit, that her family member's physician had authorized a refill of a prescription for Combigan, a dangerous drug. Complainant realleges paragraphs 11 through 15.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Commission of an Act Involving Dishonesty, Fraud, Deceit)

17. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Code section 4301, subdivision (f), in conjunction with California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, for unprofessional conduct in that Respondent committed an act involving dishonesty, fraud or deceit. Complainant realleges paragraphs 11 through 15.

THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Forgery of a Dangerous Drug Prescription)

18. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under Code section 4301, subdivisions (j) and (o), in conjunction with California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, for unprofessional conduct in that Respondent violated a state law governing dangerous drugs: to wit, Code section 4234, subdivision (a), which criminalizes forgery of drug prescriptions.
