21	1. Virginia Herold (Complainant) is the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy.					
22	She brought this action solely in her official capacity and is represented in this matter by Kamal					
23	D. Harris, Attorney General of the State of California, by Nicole R. Cook, Deputy Attorney

25	2. Stephen David Ellwood (Responden	t) is represented in this proceeding by attorney				
26	Robert F. Hahn, whose address is 2550 Ninth Street, Suite 101, Berkeley, CA 94710-2551.					
27	3. On or about August 1, 2007, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacist License No.					
28	RPH 59873 to Stephen David Ellwood (Respondent). The Pharmacist License was in full force					

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and effect at all times relevant to the charges brought in Accusation No. 3939 and will expire on December 31, 2012, unless renewed.

JURISDICTION

4. Accusation No. 3939 was filed before the Board of Pharmacy (Board), Department of Consumer Affairs, and is currently pending against Respondent. The Accusation and all other statutorily required documents were properly served on Respondent on May 18, 2011. Respondent timely filed his Notice of Defense contesting the Accusation. A copy of Accusation No. 3939 is attached as Exhibit A and incorporated by reference.

ADVISEMENT AND WAIVERS

- Respondent has carefully read, fully discussed with counsel, and understands the charges and allegations in Accusation No. 3939. Respondent also has carefully read, fully discussed with counsel, and understands the effects of this Stipulated Surrender of License and Order.
- 6. Respondent is fully aware of his legal rights in this matter, including the right to a hearing on the charges and allegations in the Accusation; the right to confront and cross-examine the witnesses against him; the right to present evidence and to testify on his own behalf; the right to the issuance of subpoenas to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of documents; the right to reconsideration and court review of an adverse decision; and all other rights accorded by the California Administrative Procedure Act and other applicable laws.
- 7. Respondent voluntarily, knowingly, and intelligently waives and gives up each and every right set forth above.

CULPABILITY

- 8. Respondent understands that the charges and allegations in Accusation No. 3939, if proven at a hearing, constitute cause for imposing discipline upon his Pharmacist License.
- 9. Respondent, while not admitting to any specific allegation, agrees that in the event that this matter proceeded to hearing Complainant would establish sufficient factual basis for imposing discipline on his license. Respondent hereby gives up his right to contest that cause for discipline exists based on those charges.

10. Respondent understands that by signing this stipulation he enables the Board to issue an order accepting the surrender of his Pharmacist License without further process.

CONTINGENCY

- 11. This stipulation shall be subject to approval by the Board of Pharmacy. Respondent understands and agrees that counsel for Complainant and the staff of the Board of Pharmacy may communicate directly with the Board regarding this stipulation and surrender, without notice to or participation by Respondent or his counsel. By signing the stipulation, Respondent understands and agrees that he may not withdraw his agreement or seek to rescind the stipulation prior to the time the Board considers and acts upon it. If the Board fails to adopt this stipulation as its Decision and Order, the Stipulated Surrender and Disciplinary Order shall be of no force or effect, except for this paragraph, it shall be inadmissible in any legal action between the parties, and the Board shall not be disqualified from further action by having considered this matter.
- 12. The parties understand and agree that facsimile copies of this Stipulated Surrender of License and Order, including facsimile signatures thereto, shall have the same force and effect as the originals.
- 13. This Stipulated Surrender of License and Order is intended by the parties to be an integrated writing representing the complete, final, and exclusive embodiment of their agreement. It supersedes any and all prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, discussions, negotiations, and commitments (written or oral). This Stipulated Surrender of License and Order may not be altered, amended, modified, supplemented, or otherwise changed except by a writing executed by an authorized representative of each of the parties.
- 14. In consideration of the foregoing admissions and stipulations, the parties agree that the Board may, without further notice or formal proceeding, issue and enter the following Order:

<u>ORDER</u>

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Pharmacist License No. RPH 59873, issued to Respondent Stephen David Ellwood, is surrendered and accepted by the Board of Pharmacy.

1. The surrender of Respondent's Pharmacist License and the acceptance of the surrendered license by the Board shall constitute the imposition of discipline against Respondent.

This stipulation constitutes a record of the discipline and shall become a part of Respondent's license history with the Board of Pharmacy.

- 2. Respondent shall lose all rights and privileges as a pharmacist in California as of the effective date of the Board's Decision and Order.
- 3. Respondent shall cause to be delivered to the Board his pocket license and, if one was issued, his wall certificate on or before the effective date of the Decision and Order.
- 4. If he ever applies for licensure or petitions for reinstatement in the State of California, the Board shall treat it as a new application for licensure. Respondent must comply with all the laws, regulations and procedures for licensure in effect at the time the application or petition is filed, and all of the charges and allegations contained in Accusation No. 3939 shall be deemed to be true, correct and admitted by Respondent when the Board determines whether to grant or deny the application or petition.
- 5. Respondent shall pay the agency its costs of investigation and enforcement in the amount of \$10,000.00 prior to issuance of a new or reinstated license.
- 6. If Respondent should ever apply or reapply for a new license or certification, or petition for reinstatement of a license, by any other health care licensing agency in the State of California, all of the charges and allegations contained in Accusation, No. 3939 shall be deemed to be true, correct, and admitted by Respondent for the purpose of any Statement of Issues or any other proceeding seeking to deny or restrict licensure.

ACCEPTANCE I have carefully read the above Stipulated Surrender of License and Order and have fully discussed it with my attorney, Robert F. Hahn. I understand the stipulation and the effect it will have on my Pharmacist License. I enter into this Stipulated Surrender of License and Order voluntarily, knowingly, and intelligently, and agree to be bound by the Decision and Order of the Board of Pharmacy. Respondent I have read and fully discussed with Respondent Stephen David Ellwood the terms and conditions and other matters contained in this Stipulated Surrender of License and Order. 19	PARTIES					
20	1. Virginia Herold (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity					
21	as the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy, Department of Consumer Affairs.					
22	2. On or about August 1, 2007, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacist License					
23	Number RPH 59873 to Stephen David Ellwood (Respondent). The Pharmacist License was in					
24	full force and effect at all times relevant to the charges brought herein and will expire on					
25	December 31, 2012, unless renewed.					
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Accusation

JURISDICTION

- 3. This Accusation is brought before the Board of Pharmacy (Board), Department of Consumer Affairs, under the authority of the following laws. All section references are to the Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.
- 4. Section 118, subdivision (b), of the Code provides that the suspension, expiration, surrender, cancellation of a license shall not deprive the Board of jurisdiction to proceed with a disciplinary action during the period within which the license may be renewed, restored, reissued or reinstated.
- 5. Section 4300, subdivision (a) of the Code states in pertinent part, "every license issued may be suspended or revoked."

STATUTORY PROVISIONS

- 6. Section 4059 of the Code provides in part that a person may not furnish any dangerous drug, except upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.7. A person may not furnish any dangerous device, except upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.7.
 - 7. Section 4060 of the Code states:

No person shall possess any controlled substance, except that furnished to a person upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.7, or furnished pursuant to a drug order issued by a certified nurse-midwife pursuant to Section 2746.51, a nurse practitioner pursuant to Section 2836.1, or a physician assistant pursuant to Section 3502.1, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.5, or a pharmacist pursuant to either subparagraph (D) of paragraph (4) of, or clause (iv) of subparagraph (A) of paragraph (5) of, subdivision (a) of Section 4052. This section shall not apply to the possession of any controlled substance by a manufacturer, wholesaler, pharmacy, pharmacist, physician, podiatrist, dentist, optometrist, veterinarian, naturopathic doctor, certified nurse-midwife, nurse practitioner, or physician assistant, when in stock in containers correctly labeled with the name and address of the supplier or producer.

Nothing in this section authorizes a certified nurse-midwife, a nurse practitioner, a physician assistant, or a naturopathic doctor, to order his or her own stock of dangerous drugs and devices.

8: Section 4081(b) of the Code states:

The owner, officer, and partner of a pharmacy, wholesaler, or veterinary food-animal drug retailer shall be jointly responsible, with the pharmacist-in-charge or designated representative-in-charge, for maintaining the records and inventory described in this section.

9. Section 4301 of the Code states:

The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

(h) The administering to oneself, of any controlled substance, or the use of any dangerous drug or of alcoholic beverages to the extent or in a manner as to be dangerous or injurious to oneself, to a person holding a license under this chapter, or to any other person or to the public, or to the extent that the use impairs the ability of the person to conduct with safety to the public the practice authorized by the license.

(j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, or any other state, or of the United States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs.

(o) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or abetting the violation of or conspiring to violate any provision or term of this chapter or of the applicable federal and state laws and regulations governing pharmacy, including regulations established by the board or by any other state or federal regulatory agency.

10. Section 4327 of the Code provides that any person who, while on duty, sells, dispenses or compounds any drug while under the influence of any dangerous drug or alcoholic beverages shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

11. Health and Safety Code section 11170 provides that no person shall prescribe, administer, or furnish a controlled substance for himself.

- 12. Health and Safety Code section 11171 provides that no person shall prescribe, administer, or furnish a controlled substance except under the conditions and in the manner provided by this division.
- 13. Health and Safety Code section 11173(a) provides that no person shall obtain or attempt to obtain controlled substances, or procure or attempt to procure the administration of or prescription for controlled substances, (1) by fraud, deceit, misrepresentation, or subterfuge; or (2) by the concealment of a material fact.

REGULATIONS

14. Title 16, California Code of Regulations section 1714(d) states:

Each pharmacist while on duty shall be responsible for the security of the prescription department, including provisions for effective control against theft or diversion of dangerous drugs and devices, and records for such drugs and devices. Possession of a key to the pharmacy where dangerous drugs and controlled substances are stored shall be restricted to a pharmacist.

15. Title 16, California Code of Regulations section 1718 states:

"Current Inventory" as used in Sections 4081 and 4332 of the Business and Professions Code shall be considered to include complete accountability for all dangerous drugs handled by every licensee enumerated in Sections 4081 and 4332. The controlled substances inventories required by Title 21, CFR, Section 1304 shall be available for inspection upon request for at least 3 years after the date of the inventory.

16. Title 21, Code of Federal Regulations, section 1307.21(b)(1) requires that a controlled substance be disposed of properly, by several approved means, including transferral to a registrant.

COST RECOVERY

17. Section 125.3 of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of the case.

DRUG

- 18. Ambien, a brand name for zolpidem tartrate, is a Schedule IV controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(d)(32), and is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business & Professions Code section 4022.
- 19. Ativan, the brand name for lorazepam, is a Schedule IV controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(d)(16), and is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4022. Ativan is used in the treatment of anxiety disorders and for short-term (up to 4 months) relief of the symptoms of anxiety.
- 20. Diazepam, the generic name for Valium, is a Schedule IV controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code Section 11057(d)(9), and is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4022.
- 21. Hydrocodone bitartate/acetaminophen, also known by the brand names Vicodin, Norco, Zydone, Maxidone, Lortab, Lorcet, Hydrocet, Co-Gesic, and Anexsia, is a narcotic Schedule III controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11056(e)(4), and is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4022. Hydrocodone is used as a narcotic analgesic in the relief of pain.
- 22. Dalmane, a brand name of flurazepam hydrochloride, is a Schedule IV controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(d)(14), and is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4022.
- 23. Darvocet, a brand name for propoxyphene naphsylate and acetaminophen, is a Schedule IV controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(c)(2), and is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4022.
- 24. Oxazepam, sold under the brand name Serax, is a Schedule IV controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(d)(23), is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4022. Oxazepam is used to treat anxiety disorders or alcohol withdrawal symptoms.

- 25. Phentermine, sold under the brand names Fastin and Adipex-P, is a Schedule IV controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code section 11057(f)(4), and is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4022.
- 26. Restoril, a brand name for temazepam, is a Schedule IV controlled substance as designated by Health and Safety Code Section 11057(d)(29), and is a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4022. Restoril is a central nervous depressant used to treat insomnia and sleep disorders.

FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

- 27. Respondent was employed as the Pharmacist-in-Charge at Ralphs grocery store #611 in Palm Springs, California from May 4, 2009 through September 9, 2009. Ralphs initiated an investigation after discovery of inventory discrepancies. During the investigation, Respondent was interviewed after complaints received by customers, complaining that Respondent appeared impaired.
- 28. On August 20, 2009, the Pharmacy District Manager and Store Director interviewed Respondent. During the interview, Respondent "was having a hard time staying awake and focusing on the questions that were being asked." Respondent appeared sleepy, did not respond to questions immediately, closed his eyes for periods while being spoken to, and his responses were almost incoherent. Due to his impaired state, Respondent was driven to Desert Oasis Health Care facility to have a drug test performed. Pending the drug test results, Ralphs placed Respondent on suspension. Respondent tested positive for Benzodiaepines; specifically, Nordiazepam and Oxazepam.
- 29. On August 31, 2009, Respondent was interviewed again by the Pharmacy District Manager and Store Director. During the interview, Respondent "was confused and had a difficult time answering the questions." Respondent was advised that his drug test came back positive. When asked about a bottle of medication that Respondent handled on August 3, 2009 as seen in a Ralphs' surveillance video, Respondent stated that he remembered "putting the medication back on the shelf' because he "was going to discard it because the bottled medication was out dated," but instead, he "just put it back on the shelf because it was out of stock." Respondent could not

recall taking the bottle home. Respondent could not recall what he did with the bottle but stated that he wanted to "discard the bottle" and "take the bottle to the restroom and pour it out," but that he did not. Respondent then stated that he did not remember if he poured the medication out. During the interview, Respondent changed his statement and alleged that he "was hiding a bottle of cough syrup with codeine because he did not want [the pharmacy technician] to take it."

- 30. On September 9, 2009, Ralphs terminated Respondent for being "under the influence of a controlled substance." The LabCorp drug test results for Respondent taken on August 20, 2009 reflect that Respondent tested positive for Benzodiazepines: Nordiazepam and Oxazepam. The last prescription for oxazepam that Respondent filled was on May 8, 2008. Respondent did not have a prescription filled for diazepam from March 10, 2007 through August 19, 2009. According to Respondent's Costco prescription records, Respondent filled his first diazepam prescription after his drug test by Ralphs on August 20, 2009. The diazepam prescription (dated June 26, 2009) was received by Costco at 5:53 p.m. on August 20, 2009, and picked up the same day at 6:19 p.m. Respondent went to 10 different pharmacies to fill his prescriptions in a 3 year period, preventing any single pharmacy from knowing what Respondent was taking. Most prescriptions filled by Respondent were Benzodiazepines, such as temazepam, oxazepam, lorazepam, flurazepam, and diazepam. Respondent also filled prescriptions for narcotics such as hydrocodone/APAP and propoxyphene. Respondent also filled for himself, RX #4750093 for Hydrocodone/APAP 5-500 on June 29, 2009 and RX #4750120 for Zolpidem 10 mg on July 6, 2009 at Ralphs #611.
- 31. In a letter to Ralphs dated September 1, 2009, Respondent apologized for confusion caused by his statements on August 31, indicating that he was "just back from a trip with a night of poor sleep and hours on the road." Respondent admitted that he "only felt extremely sleepy on the job on one occasion when a dose of Benadryl hung [him] over longer than [he] planned;" however, he did not specify the exact date of this occasion. With regard to the incident on August 20, Respondent stated that the prescription medication that he had taken the night before had no history of making him feel intoxicated or unable to perform well after 5 hours. He also stated that he was "a bit sleepy on the 20th date due to an active cold." Respondent also referenced the

bottle of cough syrup that he was questioned about. Respondent admitted that the bottle "probably had hydro-codone in it" and it amounted to "just over 80 ml of expiring red syrup whose label was mostly removed." Respondent explained that he carried the bottle to the back of the store because he did not have clear guidance on how to dispose of it and he had learned that a toilet was the appropriate way to dispose of liquid medications. Respondent stated that he stored the medication temporarily in the back corner of the pharmacy because he did not have a secure place to store the medications away from his technician. Respondent admitted that he "stored it once or twice next to [his] briefcase-bag with the intention of draining it in the toilet in the back corner of the store." Respondent stated that he ended up disposing the contents "discretely and quickly" at some point that week in the pharmacy sink. He indicated that he "may have thrown out the bottle, but it may also be one of the 2 amber bottles [he keeps] for use in making plant feeding solutions at home."

- 32. A pharmacist at Ralphs reported that she saw a picture of Respondent sleeping in a sleeping bag in one of the drug aisles. She reported that the photograph showed Respondent sleeping in the aisle where the hydrocodone, diazepam and Lyrica products are stored and that it is an aisle that cannot by seen by customers at the pharmacy counter. The pharmacist reported that a customer, E.P. complained to her, stating that he thought Respondent was drunk because he was stumbling around when he picked up his prescription.
- 33. Ralphs' pharmacy technician reported that she worked with Respondent often. When she discovered Respondent sleeping on top of a sleeping bag in one of the drug aisles, she took a photograph of him with her phone and showed it to the pharmacist. She also reported that after a few months, Respondent became very sluggish, lethargic, monotone, and quiet. The pharmacy technician also reported that she observed Respondent "impaired" at least three times while working with him. She recalled one incident when a customer, E.P., picked up his prescription and she observed Respondent stumble when he got off his stool and staggered when he walked. The pharmacy technician reported that Respondent's eyes rolled back and E.P. asked her if Respondent was drunk. When the pharmacy technician asked Respondent if he was okay,

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Respondent stated that he had taken four capsules of Benadryl. The pharmacy technician also observed Respondent sleeping on his breaks in the aisle where drugs were stored.

- 34. It was also reported by a Ralphs Clerk that Respondent fell asleep while on hold with a call to a pharmacy on August 3, 2009. She reported that she saw his eyes drooping closed and then completely closed. The Clerk reported that she had to wake Respondent up and that he could not stay on task.
- 35. Respondent filled 83 prescriptions for Ralphs' customers on August 3, 2009 and 24 prescriptions for Ralphs' customers on August 20, 2009. A review of the prescriptions filled on August 3, 2009 by Respondent reflect that he made unusual errors when filling prescriptions. For patient E.V., he entered two "enter/delete" pairs before a correct entry for Triazolam .25 mg. For patient L.H., he entered twenty-two "enter/delete" pairs for Advair 250-50, and three "enter/delete" pairs for patient R.H. for Acyclovir 400 mg.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct – Violating Laws Regulating Controlled Substances)

36. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action for unprofessional conduct under section 4301(j) of the Code in that he violated 21 Code of Federal Regulations Section 1307.21(b)(1) requiring controlled substances to be disposed of properly, in that on September 1, 2009, Respondent admitted that he inappropriately disposed of approximately 80 ml of a red, hydrocodone syrup, a controlled substance, down the pharmacy sink without the proper records of disposal as set forth in paragraphs 27-35 above, incorporated herein by reference.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct – Violation of Chapter)

37. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action for unprofessional conduct under section 4301(o) of the Code, in that as the Pharmacist in Charge, Respondent failed to maintain an accurate inventory with complete accountability of all dangerous drugs by inappropriately disposing of hydrocodone syrup in violation of Code section 4081(b) and California Code of Regulations section 1718, as detailed in paragraphs 27-35 above, incorporated herein by reference.

THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct - Violation of Chapter)

38. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action for unprofessional conduct under section 4301(o) of the Code, in that in that while on duty at Ralphs, Respondent filled and dispensed prescriptions to Ralphs' customers while under the influence of controlled substances/dangerous drugs on August 3, 2009 and August 20, 2009, in violation of Code section 4327, as detailed in paragraphs 27-35 above, incorporated herein by reference.

FOURTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct - Violation of Chapter)

39. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action for unprofessional conduct under section 4301(o) of the Code, in that Respondent furnished a controlled substance to himself by filling two prescriptions for himself at Ralphs #611 in violation of Health and Safety Code section 11170, as detailed in paragraphs 27-35 above, incorporated herein by reference.

FIFTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct – Self Administration of Controlled Substances)

40. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action for unprofessional conduct under section 4301(h) of the Code, in that Respondent self-administered a controlled substance, Diazepam, to an extent or in a manner dangerous to himself or others and without a valid prescription in violation section 4059(a) and Health and Safety Code section 11171, as detailed in paragraphs 28-35 above, incorporated herein by reference.

SIXTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct - Violation of Chapter)

41. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action for unprofessional conduct under section 4301(o) of the Code, in that Respondent self-administered a controlled substance, Diazepam, without a valid prescription in violation section 4059(a) and Health and Safety Code section 11171, as detailed in paragraphs 28-35 above, incorporated herein by reference.

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<u>PRAYER</u>

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged, and that following the hearing, the Board of Pharmacy issue a decision:

- 1. Revoking or suspending Pharmacist License Number RPH 59873, issued to Stephen David Ellwood;
- 2. Ordering Stephen David Ellwood to pay the Board of Pharmacy the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of this case, pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 125.3;
 - 3. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
