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		STIPULATED SETTLEMENT (4559)

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Respondent Michael Richard Jay (Respondent) is represented in this proceeding by
 Courtney E. Pilchman, Esq., whose address is: 2030 Main St., Suite 1300 Irvine, CA 92614.
 On or about August 17, 1981, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacist No. RPH
 36457 to Michael Richard Jay (Respondent). The Pharmacist License was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the charges brought in First Amended Accusation No. 4559 and will expire on February 28, 2015, unless renewed.

#### JURISDICTION

4. First Amended Accusation No. 4559 was filed before the Board of Pharmacy (Board),
Department of Consumer Affairs, and is currently pending against Respondent. The First
Amended Accusation and all other statutorily required documents were properly served on
Respondent on February 25, 2014. Respondent timely filed his Notice of Defense contesting the
Accusation.

13 5. A copy of First Amended Accusation No. 4559 is attached as exhibit A and
14 incorporated herein by reference.

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## ADVISEMENT AND WAIVERS

6. Respondent has carefully read, fully discussed with counsel, and understands the
charges and allegations in First Amended Accusation No. 4559. Respondent has also carefully
read, fully discussed with counsel, and understands the effects of this Stipulated Settlement and
Disciplinary Order.

7. Respondent is fully aware of his legal rights in this matter, including the right to a
hearing on the charges and allegations in the First Amended Accusation; the right to confront and
cross-examine the witnesses against him; the right to present evidence and to testify on his own
behalf; the right to the issuance of subpoenas to compel the attendance of witnesses and the
production of documents; the right to reconsideration and court review of an adverse decision;
and all other rights accorded by the California Administrative Procedure Act and other applicablelaws.

8. Respondent voluntarily, knowingly, and intelligently waives and gives up each and every right set forth above.

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9. Respondent admits the truth of each and every charge and allegation in First Amended Accusation No. 4559.

10. Respondent agrees that his Pharmacist License is subject to discipline and he agrees to be bound by the Board's probationary terms as set forth in the Disciplinary Order below.

#### CONTINGENCY

CULPABILITY

7 11. This stipulation shall be subject to approval by the Board of Pharmacy. Respondent understands and agrees that counsel for Complainant and the staff of the Board of Pharmacy may 8 communicate directly with the Board regarding this stipulation and settlement, without notice to 9 or participation by Respondent or his counsel. By signing the stipulation, Respondent 10 understands and agrees that he may not withdraw his agreement or seek to rescind the stipulation 11 prior to the time the Board considers and acts upon it. If the Board fails to adopt this stipulation 12 as its Decision and Order, the Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order shall be of no force or 13 effect, except for this paragraph, it shall be inadmissible in any legal action between the parties, 14 and the Board shall not be disqualified from further action by having considered this matter. 15

16 12. The parties understand and agree that Portable Document Format (PDF) and facsimile
17 copies of this Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order, including facsimile signatures
18 thereto, shall have the same force and effect as the originals.

This Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order is intended by the parties to be an
 integrated writing representing the complete, final, and exclusive embodiment of their agreement.
 It supersedes any and all prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, discussions,
 negotiations, and commitments (written or oral). This Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary
 Order may not be altered, amended, modified, supplemented, or otherwise changed except by a
 writing executed by an authorized representative of each of the parties.

25 14. In consideration of the foregoing admissions and stipulations, the parties agree that
 26 the Board may, without further notice or formal proceeding, issue and enter the following
 27 Disciplinary Order:

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## DISCIPLINARY ORDER

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Pharmacist License No. RPH 36457 issued to Michael Richard Jay (Respondent) is revoked. However, the revocation is stayed and Respondent is placed on probation for five (5) years on the following terms and conditions.

1. Suspension

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As part of probation, respondent is suspended from working as a pharmacist for 180 days beginning the effective date of this decision.

During suspension, respondent shall not enter any pharmacy area or any portion of or any 8 other board licensed premises (wholesaler, veterinary food-animal drug retailer or any other 9 distributor of drugs) any drug manufacturer, or any other location where dangerous drugs and 10 devices or controlled substances are maintained. Respondent shall not do any act involving drug 11 selection, selection of stock, manufacturing, compounding or dispensing; nor shall respondent 12 manage, administer, or assist any licensee of the board. Respondent shall not have access to or 13 control the ordering, manufacturing or dispensing of dangerous drugs and devices or controlled 14 substances. 15

#### 2. Obey All Laws

Respondent shall obey all state and federal laws and regulations.

Respondent shall report any of the following occurrences to the board, in writing, within seventy-two (72) hours of such occurrence:

an arrest or issuance of a criminal complaint for violation of any provision of the Pharmacy Law, state and federal food and drug laws, or state and federal controlled substances laws

a plea of guilty or nolo contendre in any state or federal criminal proceeding to any criminal complaint, information or indictment

a conviction of any crime

discipline, citation, or other administrative action filed by any state or federal agency which involves respondent's pharmacist license or which is related to the practice of pharmacy or the manufacturing, obtaining, handling, distributing, billing, or charging for any drug, device or controlled substance.

Failure to timely report any such occurrence shall be considered a violation of probation.

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## 3. Report to the Board

Respondent shall report to the board quarterly, on a schedule as directed by the board or its 2 designee. The report shall be made either in person or in writing, as directed. Among other 3 requirements, respondent shall state in each report under penalty of perjury whether there has 4 been compliance with all the terms and conditions of probation. Failure to submit timely reports 5 in a form as directed shall be considered a violation of probation. Any period(s) of delinquency 6 in submission of reports as directed may be added to the total period of probation. Moreover, if 7 the final probation report is not made as directed, probation shall be automatically extended until 8 such time as the final report is made and accepted by the board. 9

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## 4. Interview with the Board

Upon receipt of reasonable prior notice, respondent shall appear in person for interviews with the board or its designee, at such intervals and locations as are determined by the board or its designee. Failure to appear for any scheduled interview without prior notification to board staff, or failure to appear at two (2) or more scheduled interviews with the board or its designee during the period of probation, shall be considered a violation of probation.

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#### 5. Cooperate with Board Staff

17 Respondent shall cooperate with the board's inspection program and with the board's
18 monitoring and investigation of respondent's compliance with the terms and conditions of his
19 probation. Failure to cooperate shall be considered a violation of probation.

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#### 6. Continuing Education

21Respondent shall provide evidence of efforts to maintain skill and knowledge as a22pharmacist as directed by the board or its designee.

7. No Supervision of Interns, Serving as a Pharmacist in Charge (PIC), Serving as Designated Representative –in-Charge, or Serving as a Consultant

25During the period of probation, respondent shall not supervise any intern pharmacist, be the26pharmacist-in-charge or designated representative-in-charge of any entity licensed by the board

- 27 nor serve as a consultant unless otherwise specified in this order. Assumption of any such
- 28 unauthorized supervision responsibilities shall be considered a violation of probation.
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#### 8. Notice to Employers

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During the period of probation, respondent shall notify all present and prospective employers of the decision in case number 4559 and the terms, conditions and restrictions imposed on respondent by the decision, as follows: 4

Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, and within fifteen (15) days of 5 respondent undertaking any new employment, respondent shall cause his direct supervisor, 6 pharmacist-in-charge (including each new pharmacist-in-charge employed during respondent's 7 tenure of employment) and owner to report to the board in writing acknowledging that the listed 8 individual(s) has/have read the decision in case number 4559 and the terms and conditions 9 imposed thereby. It shall be respondent's responsibility to ensure that his employer(s) and/or 10 supervisor(s) submit timely acknowledgement(s) to the board. 11

If respondent works for or is employed by or through a pharmacy employment service, 12 respondent must notify his direct supervisor, pharmacist-in-charge and owner at every pharmacy 13 of the terms and conditions of the decision in case number 4559 in advance of the respondent 14 commencing work at each pharmacy. A record of this notification must be provided to the board 15 upon request. 16

Furthermore, within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, and within fifteen 17 (15) days of respondent undertaking any new employment by or through a pharmacy employment 18 service, respondent shall cause his direct supervisor with the pharmacy employment service to 19 report to the board in writing acknowledging that he has read the decision in case number 4559 20and the terms and conditions imposed thereby. It shall be respondent's responsibility to ensure 21 that his employer(s) and/or supervisor(s) submit timely acknowledgment(s) to the board. 22 Failure to timely notify present or prospective employer(s) or to cause that/those 23

employer(s) to submit timely acknowledgements to the board shall be considered a violation of

probation. 25

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Employment" within the meaning of this provision shall include any full-time, part-time, temporary or relief service or pharmacy management service as a pharmacist, pharmacy technician or in any position for which a pharmacist or pharmacy technician license is a requirement or criterion for employment, whether the respondent is considered an employee, independent contractor or volunteer.

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## 9. Reimbursement of Board Costs

As a condition precedent to successful completion of probation, respondent shall pay to the board its costs of investigation and prosecution in the amount of \$3,520,00. Respondent shall make monthly payments as directed by the Board or it designee in the amount of \$97.78 until paid in full. There shall be no deviation from this schedule absent prior written approval by the board or its designee. Failure to pay costs by the deadline(s) as directed shall be considered a violation of probation.

8 The filing of bankruptcy by respondent shall not relieve respondent of his responsibility to
9 reimburse the board its costs of investigation and prosecution.

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10. Probation Monitoring Costs

Respondent shall pay any costs associated with probation monitoring as determined by the board each and every year of probation. Such costs shall be payable to the board on a schedule as directed by the board or its designee. Failure to pay such costs by the deadline(s) as directed shall be considered a violation of probation.

11. Status of License

Respondent shall, at all times while on probation, maintain an active, current pharmacist
license with the board, including any period during which suspension or probation is tolled.
Failure to maintain an active, current license shall be considered a violation of probation.

19 If respondent's pharmacist license expires or is cancelled by operation of law or otherwise 20 at any time during the period of probation, including any extensions thereof due to tolling or 21 otherwise, upon renewal or reapplication respondent's license shall be subject to all terms and 22 conditions of this probation not previously satisfied.

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## 12. License Surrender While on Probation/Suspension

Following the effective date of this decision, should respondent cease work due to retirement or health, or be otherwise unable to satisfy the terms and conditions of probation, respondent may tender his pharmacist license to the board for surrender. The board or its designee shall have the discretion whether to grant the request for surrender or take any other action it deems appropriate and reasonable. Upon formal acceptance of the surrender of the

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license, respondent will no longer be subject to the terms and conditions of probation. This surrender constitutes a record of discipline and shall become a part of the respondent's license history with the board.

4 Upon acceptance of the surrender, respondent shall relinquish his pharmacist license to the 5 board within ten (10) days of notification by the board that the surrender is accepted. Respondent 6 may not reapply for any license, permit, or registration from the board for three (3) years from the 7 effective date of the surrender. Respondent shall meet all requirements applicable to the license 8 sought as of the date the application for that license is submitted to the board.

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13. Notification of a Change in Name, Residence Address, Mailing Address or Employment

Respondent shall notify the board in writing within ten (10) days of any change of employment. Said notification shall include the reasons for leaving, the address of the new employer, the name of the supervisor and owner, and the work schedule if known. Respondent shall further notify the board in writing within ten (10) days of a change in name, residence address and mailing address, or phone number.

Failure to timely notify the board of any change in employer(s), name(s), address(es), or phone number(s) shall be considered a violation of probation.

14. Tolling of Probation

Except during periods of suspension, respondent shall, at all times while on probation, be
employed as a pharmacist in California for a minimum of 40 hours per calendar month. Any
month during which this minimum is not met shall toll the period of probation, i.e., the period of
probation shall be extended by one month for each month during which this minimum is not met.
During any such period of tolling of probation, respondent must nonetheless comply with all

terms and conditions of probation.

Should respondent, regardless of residency, for any reason (including vacation) cease
working as a pharmacist for a minimum of 40 hours per calendar month in California, respondent
must notify the board in writing within ten (10) days of cessation of work and must further notify
the board in writing within ten (10) days of the resumption of the work. Any failure to provide

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such notification(s) shall be considered a violation of probation.

It is a violation of probation for respondent's probation to remain tolled pursuant to the provisions of this condition for a total period, counting consecutive and non-consecutive months, exceeding thirty-six (36) months.

'Cessation of work' means calendar month during which respondent is not working for at least 40 hours as a pharmacist, as defined in Business and Professions Code section 4115. 'Resumption of work' means any calendar month during which respondent is working as a pharmacist for at least 40 hours as a pharmacist as defined by Business and Professions Code section 4115.

15. Violation of Probation

9 If a respondent has not complied with any term or condition of probation, the board shall 10 have continuing jurisdiction over respondent, and probation shall automatically be extended, until 11 all terms and conditions have been satisfied or the board has taken other action as deemed 12 appropriate to treat the failure to comply as a violation of probation, to terminate probation, and 13 to impose the penalty that was stayed.

14 If respondent violates probation in any respect, the board, after giving respondent notice 15 and an opportunity to be heard, may revoke probation and carry out the disciplinary order that 16 was stayed. Notice and opportunity to be heard are not required for those provisions stating that a 17 violation thereof may lead to automatic termination of the stay and/or revocation of the license. If 18 a petition to revoke probation or an accusation is filed against respondent during probation, the 19 board shall have continuing jurisdiction, and the period of probation shall be automatically 20 extended until the petition to revoke probation or accusation is heard and decided.

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16. Completion of Probation

Upon written notice by the board indicating successful completion of probation,
respondent's pharmacist license will be fully restored.

Respondent shall not direct, control or perform any aspect of the practice of pharmacy.
Subject to the above restrictions, respondent may continue to own or hold an interest in any
licensed premises in which he or she holds an interest at the time this decision becomes effective
unless otherwise specified in this order.

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Failure to comply with this suspension shall be considered a violation of probation.

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## 17. No Ownership of Licensed Premises

Respondent shall not own, have any legal or beneficial interest in, or serve as a manager,
administrator, member, officer, director, trustee, associate, or partner of any business, firm,
partnership, or corporation currently or hereinafter licensed by the board. Respondent shall sell
or transfer any legal or beneficial interest in any entity licensed by the board within ninety (90)
days following the effective date of this decision and shall immediately thereafter provide written
proof thereof to the board. Failure to timely divest any legal or beneficial interest(s) or provide
documentation thereof shall be considered a violation of probation.

9 Respondent shall not acquire any new ownership, legal or beneficial interest nor serve as a 10 manager, administrator, member, officer, director, trustee, associate, or partner of any additional business, firm, partnership, or corporation licensed by the board. If respondent currently owns or 11 has any legal or beneficial interest in, or serve as a manager, administrator, member, officer, 12 director, trustee, associate, or partner of any business, firm, partnership, or corporation currently 13 or hereinafter licensed by the board, respondent may continue to serve in such capacity or hold 14 15 that interest, but only to the extent of that position or interest as of the effective of this decision. Violation of this restriction shall be considered a violation of probation. 16

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## 18. Attend Substance Abuse Recovery Relapse Prevention and Support Groups

Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, respondent shall begin regular attendance at a recognized and established substance abuse recovery support group in California, (e.g., Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, etc.) which has been approved by the board or its designee. Respondent must attend at least one group meeting per week unless otherwise directed by the board or its designee. Respondent shall continue regular attendance and submit signed and dated documentation confirming attendance with each quarterly report for the duration of probation. Failure to attend or submit documentation thereof shall be considered a violation of

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### 19. Work Site Monitor

Within ten (10) days of the effective date of this decision, respondent shall identify a work 2 site monitor, for prior approval by the board, who shall be responsible for supervising respondent 3 during working hours. Respondent shall be responsible for ensuring that the work site monitor 4 reports in writing to the board quarterly. Should the designated work site monitor determine at 5 any time during the probationary period that respondent has not maintained sobriety, he shall 6 notify the board immediately, either orally or in writing as directed. Should respondent change 7 employment, a new work site monitor must be designated, for prior approval by the board, within 8 ten (10) days of commencing new employment. Failure to identify an acceptable initial or 9 replacement work site monitor, or to ensure quarterly reports are submitted to the board, shall be 10 considered a violation of probation. 11

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## 20. Medical Evaluation

Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, and on a periodic basis 13 thereafter as may be required by the board or its designee, respondent shall undergo a medical 14 evaluation, at respondent's own expense, by a board-appointed or board-approved physician who 15 shall furnish a medical report to the board. The approved physician shall be provided with a copy 16 of the board's First Amended Accusation, this stipulation and decision. A record of this 17 notification must be provided to the board upon request. Respondent shall sign a release 18 19 authorizing the physician to furnish the board with a current diagnosis and a written report regarding the respondent's ability to function independently as a pharmacist with safety to the 2021 public. Respondent shall comply with all the recommendations of the physician if directed by the 22 board or its designee.

If the physician recommends, and the board or its designee directs, that respondent undergo medical treatment, respondent shall, within thirty (30) days of written notice from the board, submit to the board or its designee, for prior approval, the name and qualifications of a licensed physician of respondent's choice. Within thirty (30) days of approval thereof, respondent shall submit documentation to the board demonstrating the commencement of treatment with the approved physician. Should respondent, for any reason, cease treatment with the approved

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physician, respondent shall notify the board immediately and, within thirty (30) days of ceasing treatment, submit the name of a replacement physician of respondent's choice to the board or its designee for prior approval. Within thirty (30) days of approval thereof, respondent shall submit documentation to the board demonstrating the commencement of treatment with the approved replacement. Failure to comply with any deadline stated by this paragraph shall be considered a violation of probation.

Upon approval of the initial or any subsequent physician, respondent shall undergo and 7 continue treatment with that physician, at respondent's own expense, until the treating physician 8 recommends in writing to the board, and the board or its designee agrees by way of a written 9 notification to respondent, that no further treatment is necessary. Upon receipt of such 10 recommendation from the treating physician, and before determining whether to accept or reject 11 said recommendation, the board or its designee may require respondent to undergo, at 12 Respondent's own expense, a medical evaluation by a separate board-appointed or board-13 approved physician. If the approved evaluating physician recommends that respondent continue 14 treatment, the board or its designee may require respondent to continue treatment. - 15

Respondent shall take all necessary steps to ensure that any treating physician submits 16 written quarterly reports to the board concerning respondent's fitness to practice, progress in 17 18 treatment, and other such information as may be required by the board or its designee. If at any time an approved evaluating physician or respondent's approved treating physician 19 determines that respondent is unable to practice safely or independently as a pharmacist, the 20 evaluating or treating physician shall notify the board immediately by telephone and follow up by 21 written letter within three (3) working days. Upon notification from the board or its designee of 22 23 this determination, respondent shall be automatically suspended and shall not resume practice until notified by the board that practice may be resumed. 24

During suspension, respondent shall not enter any pharmacy area or any portion of the
 licensed premises of a wholesaler, veterinary food-animal drug retailer or any other distributor of
 drugs which is licensed by the board, or any manufacturer, or where dangerous drugs and devices
 or controlled substances are maintained. Respondent shall not practice as a pharmacist nor do any

act involving drug selection, selection of stock, manufacturing, compounding, dispensing or patient consultation; nor shall respondent manage, administer, or be a consultant to any licensee of the board, or have access to or control the ordering, manufacturing or dispensing of dangerous drugs and controlled substances. Respondent shall not resume practice until notified by the board.

During suspension, respondent shall not engage in any activity that requires the
professional judgment of a pharmacist. Respondent shall not direct or control any aspect of the
practice of pharmacy. Respondent shall not perform the duties of a pharmacist or a designated
representative for any entity licensed by the board.

Subject to the above restrictions, respondent may continue to own or hold an interest in any
licensed premises in which he or she holds an interest at the time this decision becomes
effective unless otherwise specified in this order. Failure to comply with this suspension shall be
considered a violation of probation.

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## 21. Pharmacist Recovery Program

Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, respondent shall contact the Pharmacists Recovery Program (PRP) for evaluation, and shall immediately thereafter enroll, successfully participate in, and complete the treatment contract and any subsequent addendums as recommended and provided by the PRP and as approved by the board or its designee. The costs for PRP participation shall be borne by the respondent

If respondent is currently enrolled in the PRP, said participation is now mandatory and as of
the effective date of this decision is no longer considered a self-referral under Business and
Professions Code section 4362(c)(2). Respondent shall successfully participate in and complete
his or her current contract and any subsequent addendums with the PRP.

Failure to timely contact or enroll in the PRP, or successfully participate in and complete the treatment contract and/or any addendums, shall be considered a violation of probation.

- Probation shall be automatically extended until respondent successfully completes the PRP.
  Any person terminated from the PRP program shall be automatically suspended by the board.
- 28 Respondent may not resume the practice of pharmacy until notified by the board in writing.

Any confirmed positive test for alcohol or for any drug not lawfully prescribed by a licensed practitioner as part of a documented medical treatment shall result in the automatic suspension of practice by respondent and shall be considered a violation of probation. Respondent may not resume the practice of pharmacy until notified by the board in writing.

During suspension, respondent shall not enter any pharmacy area or any portion of the 5 licensed premises of a wholesaler, veterinary food-animal drug retailer or any other distributor of 6 drugs which is licensed by the board, or any manufacturer, or where dangerous drugs and devices 7 or controlled substances are maintained. Respondent shall not practice pharmacy nor do any act 8 involving drug selection, selection of stock, manufacturing, compounding, dispensing or patient 9 consultation; nor shall respondent manage, administer, or be a consultant to any licensee of the 10 board, or have access to or control the ordering, manufacturing or dispensing of dangerous 11 drugs and controlled substances. Respondent shall not resume practice until notified by the 12 board. 13

During suspension, respondent shall not engage in any activity that requires the professional judgment of a pharmacist. Respondent shall not direct or control any aspect of the practice of pharmacy. Respondent shall not perform the duties of a pharmacist or a designated representative for any entity licensed by the board.

Subject to the above restrictions, respondent may continue to own or hold an interest in any
licensed premises in which he or she holds an interest at the time this decision becomes
effective unless otherwise specified in this order.

Failure to comply with this suspension shall be considered a violation of probation.
 Respondent shall pay administrative fees as invoiced by the PRP or its designee. Fees not
 timely paid to the PRP shall constitute a violation of probation. The Board will collect unpaid
 administrative fees as part of the annual probation monitoring costs if not submitted to the PRP.

22. Random Drug Screening-

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Respondent, at his or her own expense, shall participate in random testing, including but not
limited to biological fluid testing (urine, blood), breathalyzer, hair follicle testing, or other drug
screening program as directed by the board or its designee. Respondent may be required to

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participate in testing for the entire probation period and the frequency of testing will be 1 determined by the board or its designee. At all times, respondent shall fully cooperate with the 2 board or its designee, and shall, when directed, submit to such tests and samples for the 3 detection of alcohol, narcotics, hypnotics, dangerous drugs or other controlled substances as 4 the board or its designee may direct. Failure to timely submit to testing as directed shall be 5 considered a violation of probation. Upon request of the board or its designee, respondent shall 6 7 provide documentation from a licensed practitioner that the prescription for a detected drug was legitimately issued and is a necessary part of the treatment of the respondent. Failure to timely 8 provide such documentation shall be considered a violation of probation. Any confirmed 9 positive test for alcohol or for any drug not lawfully prescribed by a licensed practitioner as part 10of a documented medical treatment shall be considered a violation of probation and shall result 11 in the automatic suspension of practice of pharmacy by respondent, Respondent may not 12 resume the practice of pharmacy until notified by the board in writing. 13

During suspension, respondent shall not enter any pharmacy area or any portion of the 14 licensed premises of a wholesaler, veterinary food-animal drug retailer or any other distributor of 15 drugs which is licensed by the board, or any manufacturer, or where dangerous drugs and devices 16 or controlled substances are maintained. Respondent shall not practice pharmacy nor do any act 17 involving drug selection, selection of stock, manufacturing, compounding, dispensing or patient 18 consultation; nor shall respondent manage, administer, or be a consultant to any licensee of the 19 board, or have access to or control the ordering, manufacturing or dispensing of dangerous 20drugs and controlled substances. Respondent shall not resume practice until notified by the 21 board. 22

During suspension, respondent shall not engage in any activity that requires the professional judgment of a pharmacist. Respondent shall not direct or control any aspect of the 24 practice of pharmacy, Respondent shall not perform the duties of a pharmacist or pharmacy-25 technician or a designated representative for any entity licensed by the board. 26

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Subject to the above restrictions, respondent may continue to own or hold an interest in any licensed premises in which he or she holds an interest at the time this decision becomes effective unless otherwise specified in this order.

Failure to comply with this suspension shall be considered a violation of probation.

## 23. Abstain from Drugs and Alcohol Use

Respondent shall completely abstain from the possession or use of alcohol, controlled 6 7 substances, dangerous drugs and their associated paraphernalia except when the drugs are lawfully prescribed by a licensed practitioner as part of a documented medical treatment. Upon 8 request of the board or its designee, respondent shall provide documentation from the licensed 9 practitioner that the prescription for the drug was legitimately issued and is a necessary part of 10 the treatment of the respondent. Failure to timely provide such documentation shall be 11 12 considered a violation of probation. Respondent shall ensure that he or she is not in the same physical location as individuals who are using illicit substances even if respondent is not 13 personally ingesting the drugs. Any possession or use of alcohol, controlled substances, or 14 15 their associated paraphernalia not supported by the documentation timely provided, and/or any physical proximity to persons using illicit substances, shall be considered a violation of 16 probation. 17

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## 24. Prescription Coordination and Monitoring of Prescription Use

19 Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, respondent shall submit to the board, for its prior approval, the name and qualifications of a single physician, nurse practitioner, 20physician assistant, or psychiatrist of respondent's choice, who shall be aware of the respondent's 21 history with the use of alcohol, controlled substances, and/or dangerous drugs, and/or of mental 22 illness, and/or of gambling addiction and who will coordinate and monitor any prescriptions for 23 24 respondent for dangerous drugs, controlled substances or mood-altering drugs. The approved practitioner shall be provided with a copy of the board's First Amended Accusation and decision. 25 A record of this notification must be provided to the board upon request, Respondent shall sign a 26 release authorizing the practitioner to communicate with the board about respondent's 27 treatment(s). The coordinating physician, nurse practitioner, physician assistant, or psychiatrist 28

shall report to the board on a quarterly basis for the duration of probation regarding respondent's 1 compliance with this condition. If any substances considered addictive have been prescribed, the 2 report shall identify a program for the time limited use of any such substances. The board may 3 require that the single coordinating physician, nurse practitioner, physician assistant or 4 psychiatrist be a specialist in addictive medicine, or consult a specialist in addictive medicine. 5 Should respondent, for any reason, cease supervision by the approved practitioner, respondent 6 7 shall notify the board immediately and, within thirty (30) days of ceasing treatment, submit the name of a replacement physician, nurse practitioner, physician assistant, or psychiatrist of 8 respondent's choice to the board or its designee for its prior approval. Failure to timely submit the 9 selected practitioner or replacement practitioner to the board for approval, or to ensure the 10 required reporting thereby on the quarterly reports, shall be considered a violation of probation. 11 If at any time an approved practitioner determines that respondent is unable to practice 12 safely or independently as a pharmacist, the practitioner shall notify the board immediately by 13 telephone and follow up by written letter within three (3) working days. Upon notification from 14 the board or its designee of this determination, respondent shall be automatically suspended 15 and shall not resume practice until notified by the board that practice may be resumed. 16 17 During suspension, respondent shall not enter any pharmacy area or any portion of the licensed premises of a wholesaler, veterinary food-animal drug retailer or any other distributor of 18 19 drugs which is licensed by the board, or any manufacturer, or where dangerous drugs and devices or controlled substances are maintained. Respondent shall not practice pharmacy nor do any act 20 involving drug selection, selection of stock, manufacturing, compounding, dispensing or patient 21 consultation; nor shall respondent manage, administer, or be a consultant to any licensee of the 22 board, or have access to or control the ordering, manufacturing or dispensing of dangerous 23 drugs and controlled substances. Respondent shall not resume practice until notified by the 24 25 board.

During suspension, respondent shall not engage in any activity that requires the professional judgment of a pharmacist. Respondent shall not direct or control any aspect of the

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practice of pharmacy. Respondent shall not perform the duties of a pharmacist or a designated
 representative for any entity licensed by the board.

Subject to the above restrictions, respondent may continue to own or hold an interest in any
licensed premises in which he or she holds an interest at the time this decision becomes effective
unless otherwise specified in this order.

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## Failure to comply with this suspension shall be considered a violation of probation.

25. Supervised Practice

8 During the period of probation, respondent shall practice only under the supervision of a 9 licensed pharmacist not on probation with the board. Upon and after the effective date of this 10 decision, respondent shall not practice pharmacy and his or her license shall be automatically 11 suspended until a supervisor is approved by the board or its designee. The supervision shall 12 be, as required by the board or its designee, either:

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Continuous – At least 75% of a work week

Substantial - At least 50% of a work week

Partial - At least 25% of a work week

Daily Review - Supervisor's review of probationer's daily activities within 24 hours
Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this decision, respondent shall have his or
her supervisor submit notification to the board in writing stating that the supervisor has read the
decision in case number 4559 and is familiar with the required level of supervision as determined
by the board or its designee. It shall be the respondent's responsibility to ensure that his or her
employer(s), pharmacist-in-charge and/or supervisor(s) submit timely

acknowledgement(s) to the board. Failure to cause the direct supervisor and the pharmacist-in
-charge to submit timely acknowledgements to the board shall be considered a violation of
probation.

25If respondent changes employment, it shall be the respondent's responsibility to ensure that26his or her employer(s), pharmacist-in-charge and/or supervisor(s) submit timely

27 || acknowledgement(s) to the board. Respondent shall have his or her new supervisor, within

28 fifteen (15) days after employment commences, submit notification to the board in writing stating

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the direct supervisor and pharmacist-in-charge have read the decision in case number 4559 and is familiar with the level of supervision as determined by the board. Respondent shall not practice pharmacy and his or her license shall be automatically suspended until the board or its designee approves a new supervisor. Failure to cause the direct supervisor and the pharmacist-in-charge to submit timely acknowledgements to the board shall be considered a violation of probation.

Within ten (10) days of leaving employment, respondent shall notify the board in writing. 6 During suspension, respondent shall not enter any pharmacy area or any portion of the 7 licensed premises of a wholesaler, veterinary food-animal drug retailer or any other distributor of 8 drugs which is licensed by the board, or any manufacturer, or where dangerous drugs and devices 9 or controlled substances are maintained. Respondent shall not practice pharmacy nor do any act 10 involving drug selection, selection of stock, manufacturing, compounding, dispensing or patient 11 consultation; nor shall respondent manage, administer, or be a consultant to any licensee of the 12 board, or have access to or control the ordering, manufacturing or dispensing of dangerous 13 drugs and controlled substances. Respondent shall not resume practice until notified by the 14 board. 15

During suspension, respondent shall not engage in any activity that requires the
professional judgment of a pharmacist. Respondent shall not direct or control any aspect of the
practice of pharmacy. Respondent shall not perform the duties of pharmacist or a designated
representative for any entity licensed by the board.

Subject to the above restrictions, respondent may continue to own or hold an interest in any
licensed premises in which he or she holds an interest at the time this decision becomes
effective unless otherwise specified in this order.

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Failure to comply with this suspension shall be considered a violation of probation.

26. Criminal Probation/Parole Reports

Respondent shall provide a copy of the conditions of any criminal probation/parole to the
board, in writing, within ten (10) days of the issuance or modification of those conditions.
Respondent shall provide the name of his or her probation/parole officer to the board, in writing,
within ten (10) days after that officer is designated or a replacement for that officer is designated.

Respondent shall provide a copy of all criminal probation/parole reports to the board within ten
 (10) days after respondent receives a copy of such a report. Failure to timely make any of the
 submissions required hereby shall be considered a violation of probation.

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27. Ethics Course

Within sixty (60) calendar days of the effective date of this decision, respondent shall enroll in a course in ethics, at respondent's expense, approved in advance by the board or its designee. Failure to initiate the course during the first year of probation, and complete it within the second year of probation, is a violation of probation. Respondent shall submit a certificate of completion to the board or its designee within five days after completing the course

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## 28. Community Services Program

Within sixty (60) days of the effective date of this decision, respondent shall submit to the 11 board or its designee, for prior approval, a community service program in which respondent shall 12 provide free health-care related services on a regular basis to a community or charitable facility 13 or agency for at least 75 hours per year for the first three years of probation. Within 14 thirty (30) days of board approval thereof, respondent shall submit documentation to the board 15 demonstrating commencement of the community service program. A record of this notification 16 17 must be provided to the board upon request, Respondent shall report on progress with the community service program in the quarterly reports. Failure to timely submit, commence, or 18 comply with the program shall be considered a violation of probation. 19

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## 29. Tolling of Suspension

During the period of suspension, respondent shall not leave California for any period exceeding ten (10) days, regardless of purpose (including vacation). Any such absence in excess of ten (10) days during suspension shall be considered a violation of probation. Moreover, any absence from California during the period of suspension exceeding ten (10) days shall toll the suspension, i.e., the suspension shall be extended by one day for each day over ten (10) days respondent is absent from California. During any such period of tolling of suspension, respondent must nonetheless comply with all terms and conditions of probation.

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
Respondent must notify the board in writing within ten (10) days of departure, and must

The circumstances are as follows: 20 a. On or about September 24, 2013, in a criminal proceeding entitled *People of the* 21 State of California v. Michael Richard Jay, in Orange County Superior Court, Case Number 22 AN12NM14510, Respondent was charged with violating Vehicle Code sections 23152 23 subdivision (a), driving under the influence. Respondent was convicted on his plea of guilty to 24 driving under the influence. 25 As a result of his conviction on or about September 24, 2013, Respondent was b. 26 sentenced to 5 years probation, ordered to serve 90 days in custody and complete the 18 month 27 multiple offender DUI program, among other terms and conditions. 28 5

The facts that led to the conviction are that on or about December 17, 2012, at c. 1 approximately 10:30 p.m. the Anaheim Police Department received a call about a potential drunk 2 driver, indicating the car's license plate and driver's description. Within moments, Anaheim 3 Police stopped Respondent's car. When questioned by police, Respondent showed objective 4 signs of intoxication such as slow and slurred speech. Respondent was asked to step out of his 5 vehicle and walk to the curb, but had to be helped by officers due to his state of intoxication. 6 Respondent was asked to perform a serious of field sobriety tests, which he failed. Respondent 7 admitted to having been drinking earlier in the evening and was arrested on suspicion of DUI. 8 9 SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE (July 19, 2011 Driving Under the Influence on May 31, 2010) 10 11 13. Respondent's license is subject to discipline under Code sections 490 and 4301 subdivisions (1) in that he was convicted of a crime that is substantially related to the 12 qualifications, duties, and functions of a Pharmacist. The circumstances are as follows: 13 14 a. On or about July 19, 2012, in a criminal proceeding entitled People of the State of California v. Michael Richard Jay, in Orange County Superior Court, Case Number 15 AN10NM11993, Respondent was charged with violating Vehicle Code sections 23152 16 subdivision (a), driving under the influence. Respondent was convicted on his plea of guilty to 17 driving under the influence of prescription drugs. 18 19 b. As a result of his conviction, Respondent was sentenced to 3 years probation, and ordered to pay \$1,073 in fines, ordered to complete a first offender DUI program and serve 20 one day in jail, among other terms and conditions. 21 The facts that led to the conviction are that on or about May 31, 2010, at 22 с. approximately 5:38 p.m. Respondent attempted to turn his vehicle in front of a passenger bus. 23 Respondent's abrupt turn caused a collision between his vehicle and the passenger bus. When 24

police arrived they noticed that Respondent showed objective signs of intexication such as slow and slurred speech. Respondent was asked to perform a serious of field sobriety tests, which he

27 failed. Respondent at first denied ingesting either drugs or alcohol prior to driving, but later

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28 admitted to using Ambien and Diovan/HCT earlier in the day. Respondent was arrested and a

toxicology screen of his blood found the presence of Clonazepam, a muscle relaxant, and Clonazapam metabolites; Triazolam, a sedative; Hydroxyethlfurazepam, a derivative of the sleeping medication flurazepam; Desalkylfurazepam, a derivative of the sleeping medication Quazepam; Tramadol, a moderate to severe pain medication, and its metabolite, Hydrocodone, an opiate-derived pain medication and Zolpidem, a sedative drug sold under the brand name Ambien.

## THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

# (September 24, 2013 Conviction for Resisting a Peace Officer on March 11, 2013)

9 14. Respondent's license is subject to discipline under Code sections 490 section 4301,
10 subdivision (l) in that he was convicted of a crime that is substantially related to the
11 qualifications, duties, and functions of a Pharmacist. The circumstances are as follows:

a. On or about September 24, 2013, in a criminal proceeding entitled *People of the State of California v. Michael Jay*, in Orange County Superior Court, Case Number 13NM02713,
Respondent was convicted on his plea of guilty of violating Penal Code Section 148 subdivison
(a)(1), resisting, delaying or obstructing a peace officer.

b. As a result of his conviction on or about September 24, 2013, Respondent was
sentenced to 1 day in jail and ordered to pay \$245 in fines.

c. The facts that led to the conviction are that on or about March 11, 2013, at 18 approximately 9:53 p.m., Anaheim Police responded to Respondent's home after a 911 hang-up 19 call. Once at Respondent's home, the police interviewed Respondent's wife who complained of 20 being thrown down and pushed by Respondent. Respondent admitted that he had been drinking 21 earlier in the evening and that he and his wife had an argument. After interviewing both 22 Respondent and his wife, police attempted to arrest Respondent for domestic violence. 23 Respondent pulled away from police as they tried to handcuff him and continued to resist arrest 24 25 until several officers had to hold him down and subdue him. |||26
