(MICHAEL JOSEPH HERNANDEZ) DEFAULT DECISION & ORDER Case No. 5573

- 3. On or about June 1, 2016, Respondent was served by Certified and First Class Mail copies of the Accusation No. 5573, Statement to Respondent, Notice of Defense, Request for Discovery, and Discovery Statutes (Government Code sections 11507.5, 11507.6, and 11507.7) at Respondent's address of record which, pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4100, is required to be reported and maintained with the Board. Respondent's address of record was and is: 2106 Lansbury Street, Santa Rosa, CA 95404.
- 4. Service of the Accusation was effective as a matter of law under the provisions of Government Code section 11505, subdivision (c) and/or Business & Professions Code section 124.
 - 5. Government Code section 11506(c) states, in pertinent part:
 - (c) The respondent shall be entitled to a hearing on the merits if the respondent files a notice of defense . . . and the notice shall be deemed a specific denial of all parts of the accusation . . . not expressly admitted. Failure to file a notice of defense . . . shall constitute a waiver of respondent's right to a hearing, but the agency in its discretion may nevertheless grant a hearing.
- 6. Respondent failed to file a Notice of Defense within 15 days after service upon him of the Accusation, and therefore waived his right to a hearing on the merits of Accusation No. 5573.
 - 7. California Government Code section 11520(a) states, in pertinent part:
 - (a) If the respondent either fails to file a notice of defense . . . or to appear at the hearing, the agency may take action based upon the respondent's express admissions or upon other evidence and affidavits may be used as evidence without any notice to respondent
- 8. Pursuant to its authority under Government Code section 11520, the Board finds Respondent is in default. The Board will take action without further hearing and, based on the relevant evidence contained in the Default Decision Evidence Packet in this matter, as well as taking official notice of all the investigatory reports, exhibits and statements contained therein on file at the Board's offices regarding the allegations contained in Accusation No. 5573, finds that the charges and allegations in Accusation No. 5573, are separately and severally, found to be true and correct by clear and convincing evidence.

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ACCUSATION (Michael Joseph Hernandez)

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- 4. Section 4300 states in part:
- "(a) Every license issued may be suspended or revoked.
- "(b) The board shall discipline the holder of any license issued by the board, whose default has been entered or whose case has been heard by the board and found guilty, by any of the following methods:
 - "(1) Suspending judgment.
 - "(2) Placing him or her upon probation.
 - "(3) Suspending his or her right to practice for a period not exceeding one year.
 - "(4) Revoking his or her license.
- "(5) Taking any other action in relation to disciplining him or her as the board in its discretion may deem proper."
 - 5. Section 4300.1 states:

"The expiration, cancellation, forfeiture, or suspension of a board-issued license by operation of law or by order or decision of the board or a court of law, the placement of a license on a retired status, or the voluntary surrender of a license by a licensee shall not deprive the board of jurisdiction to commence or proceed with any investigation of, or action or disciplinary proceeding against, the licensee or to render a decision suspending or revoking the license."

STATUTORY AND REGULATORY AUTHORITY

- 6. Section 490 states in part:
- "(a) In addition to any other action that a board is permitted to take against a licensee, a board may suspend or revoke a license on the ground that the licensee has been convicted of a crime, if the crime is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of the business or profession for which the license was issued."
 - 7. Section 4301 states in part:

"The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been procured by fraud or misrepresentation or issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the

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"(h) The administering to oneself, of any controlled substance, or the use of any dangerous drug or of alcoholic beverages to the extent or in a manner as to be dangerous or injurious to oneself, to a person holding a license under this chapter, or to any other person or to the public, or to the extent that the use impairs the ability of the person to conduct with safety to the public the practice authorized by the license.

"(k) The conviction of more than one misdemeanor or any felony involving the use, consumption, or self-administration of any dangerous drug or alcoholic beverage, or any combination of those substances.

"(1) The conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a licensee under this chapter.

8. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1770, states:

"For the purpose of denial, suspension, or revocation of a personal or facility license pursuant to Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475) of the Business and Professions Code, a crime or act shall be considered substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a licensee or registrant if to a substantial degree it evidences present or potential unfitness of a licensee or registrant to perform the functions authorized by his license or registration in a manner consistent with the public health, safety, or welfare."

COST RECOVERY

9. Section 125.3 states in part:

"(a) Except as otherwise provided by law, in any order issued in resolution of a disciplinary proceeding before any board within the department or before the Osteopathic Medical Board, upon request of the entity bringing the proceedings, the administrative law judge may direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of the case."

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Diazepam, also known by the trade name Valium, is a Schedule III controlled substance under Health and Safety Code section 11057, subdivision (d)(9), and a dangerous drug within the meaning of Business and Professions Code section 4022. It is used for the management of anxiety disorders.

- Norco, a trade name for hydrocodone with acetaminophen, is a Schedule III 11. controlled substance under Health and Safety Code section 11056, subdivision (e)(3), and a dangerous drug within the meaning of Business and Professions Code section 4022. Hydrocodone is an opicid pain medication. Norco is used to relieve moderate to severe pain.
- Xanax, a trade name for Alprazolam, is a Schedule IV controlled substance under Health and Safety Code section 11057, subdivision (d)(1), and a dangerous drug within the meaning of Business and Professions Code section 4022. It is used for the management of anxiety disorders.

FACTS AND CAUSES FOR DISCIPLINE

September 2014 Incident

- 13. On September 16, 2014, sheriff detectives saw a car swerving on the road and driving erratically. This car pulled into a hospital parking lot and respondent, who was driving, needed three attempts to properly park the car.
- When the detectives walked up to respondent, the car was idling, respondent's 14. head was forward, and he looked like he was sleeping. He was wearing a hospital name tag and had a hospital coat in the car. Respondent said he had vertigo and was having an "episode." Respondent said he was a pharmacy technician at the hospital and was going to the emergency room after his shift. Respondent said he had taken Norco, Xanax, another anti-depressant drug, and a testosterone booster before he drove. He attributed his poor driving to the vertigo and a concussion several months before. He gave the detectives some pills he was carrying loosely in his pocket. Respondent said he had a prescription for Norco. He said at one time he had an addiction problem with Norco, but now only takes two a day. After performing a series of field sobriety tests, respondent was arrested.

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15. On January 20, 2016, respondent pled to driving under the influence of drugs (Veh. Code. § 23152, subd. (e)), a misdemeanor.

First Cause for Discipline Unprofessional Conduct – Use of Controlled Substance or Dangerous Drug Business and Professions Code section 4301, subdivision (h)

- 16. The allegations of paragraphs 13-15 are realleged and incorporated by reference as if fully set forth.
- 17. Repondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for the unprofessional conduct of using a dangerous drug in a manner to be dangerous or injurious to himself or another (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (h)). respondent drove a car under the influence of drugs.

Second Cause for Discipline Conviction and Professions Code section 490, subdivision (a)

- 18. The allegations of paragraphs 13-15 are realleged and incorporated by reference as fully set forth.
- 19. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for being convicted of a crime (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 490, subd. (a)). Respondent was convicted of driving under the influence of drugs (Veh. Code, § 23152, subd. (e)), a misdemeanor.

Third Cause for Discipline Unprofessional Conduct—Conviction of a Crime Substantially Related Business and Professions Code section 4301, subdivision (I)

- 20. The allegations of paragraphs 13-15 are realleged and incorporated by reference as fully set forth.
- 21. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for the unprofessional conduct of being convicted of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a pharmacy technician (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (1)). Respondent drove a car after taking narcotics. He had parked in his employer hospital's parking lot and stated that he was planning on working. He was convicted of driving under the influence of drugs (Veh. Code, § 23152, subd. (e)), a misdemeanor.

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22. On September 16, 2014, an off-duty highway patrol officer saw a car severely weaving on the road causing other cars to swerve out of its way. The car also did not move through a green light for about five to seven seconds.

- 23. Respondent, who was driving the car with his two minor children as passengers, explained that his poor driving may have been from chewing tobacco which was making him queasy. When he got out of the car, he was unsteady and appeared lethargic. He performed poorly on a series of field sobriety tests. He tested positive for Diazepam, Alprazolam, and Hydrocodone.
- 24. On January 26, 2016, respondent pled no contest to driving under the influence of drugs (Veh. Code, § 23152, subd. (e)), a misdemeanor, and admitted that a minor under 14 was a passenger during the offense (Veh. Code, § 23572, subd. (a)).

Fourth Cause for Discipline
Unprofessional Conduct — Use of Controlled Substance or Dangerous Drug
Business and Professions Code section 4301, subdivision (h)

- 25. The allegations of paragraphs 22-24 are realleged and incorporated by reference as if fully set forth.
- 26. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for the unprofessional conduct of using a dangerous drug in a manner to be dangerous or injurious to himself or another (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (h)). Respondent drove a car under the influence of drugs while a minor under 14 was a passenger.

Fifth Cause for Discipline Conviction Business and Professions Code section 490, subdivision (a)

- 27. The allegations of paragraphs 22-24 are realleged and incorporated by reference as if fully set forth.
- 28. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for being convicted of a crime (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 490, subd. (a)). Respondent was convicted of driving under the influence of drugs (Veh. Code, § 23152, subd. (e)), a misdemeanor.

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Sixth Cause for Discipline Unprofessional Conduct – More than One Conviction Involving Dangerous Drugs Business and Professions Code section 4301, subdivision (k)

- 29. The allegations of paragraphs 13-15 and 22-24 are realleged and incorporated by reference as if fully set forth.
- 30. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for the unprofessional conduct of being convicted of more than one misdemeanor involving the use of dangerous drugs (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (I)). Respondent was convicted on January 20 and 26, 2016, in two separate cases of driving under the influence of drugs (Veh. Code, § 23152, subd. (e)), a misdemeanor.

Seventh Cause for Discipline Unprofessional Conduct – Conviction of a Crime Substantially Related Business and Professions Code section 4301, subdivision (I)

- 31. The allegations of paragraphs 22-24 are realleged and incorporated by reference as if fully set forth.
- 32. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for the unprofessional conduct of being convicted of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions, and duties of a pharmacy technician (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (I)).

 Respondent was convicted of driving under the influence of drugs (Veh. Code, § 23152, subd. (e)), a misdemeanor.

PRAYER

WHEREFORE, complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters alleged in this accusation, and that following the hearing, the Board issues a decision:

- 1. Revoking or suspending Pharmacy Technician Registration No. TCH 87747 issued to respondent;
- 2. Ordering respondent under Business and Professions Code section 125.3 to pay the Board of Pharmacy the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of this case; and

Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
