24	1. Virginia Herold (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity		
25	as the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy, Department of Consumer Affairs.		
26	2. On or about November 13, 1990, the Board of Pharmacy issued Permit Number PHY		
27	36858 to Waterfront Pharmacy with Joseph M. Huante designated as the Pharmacist-in-Charge,		
28	Thelma Ramseyer as a fifty percent Partner and Joseph M. Huante as a fifty percent Partner

(hereinafter "Respondent Waterfront Pharmacy"). The Permit was in full force and effect at all 1 times relevant to the charges brought herein and will expire on November 1, 2017, unless 2 renewed. 3 3. On or about January 27, 1982, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacist License 4 Number RPH 36843 to Joseph Manuel Huante (hereinafter "Respondent Huante"). The 5 Pharmacist License was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the charges brought herein 6 and will expire on January 31, 2018, unless renewed. 7 JURISDICTION 8 This Accusation is brought before the Board of Pharmacy (Board), Department of 4. 9 Consumer Affairs, under the authority of the following laws. All section references are to the 10 Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated. 11 5. Section 4011 of the Code provides that the Board shall administer and enforce both 12 the Pharmacy Law [Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4000 et seq.] and the Uniform Controlled Substances 13 Act [Health & Safety Code, § 11000 et seq.] 14 6. Section 4300, subdivision (a), of the Code provides that every license issued by the 15 Board may be suspended or revoked. 16 7. Section 4300.1 of the Code provides that the expiration, cancellation, forfeiture, or 17 suspension of a Board-issued license, the placement of a license on a retired status, or the 18 voluntary surrender of a license by a licensee shall not deprive the Board of jurisdiction to 19 commence or proceed with any investigation of, or action or disciplinary proceeding against, the 20licensee or to render a decision suspending or revoking the license. 21 STATUTORY AND REGULATORY PROVISIONS 22 8. Section 4059 of the Code, in pertinent part, prohibits furnishing of any dangerous 23 drug or dangerous device except upon the prescription of an authorized prescriber. 24 9. Section 4081 of the Code states, in pertinent part: 25 (a) All records of manufacture and of sale, acquisition, receipt, shipment or disposition of 26 27dangerous drugs or dangerous devices shall be at all times during business hours open to 28 inspection by authorized officers of the law, and shall be preserved for at least three years from 2

the date of making. A current inventory shall be kept by every manufacturer, wholesaler, thirdparty logistics provider, pharmacy, veterinary food-animal drug retailer, physician, dentist,
podiatrist, veterinarian, laboratory, clinic, hospital, institution, or establishment holding a
currently valid and unrevoked certificate, license, permit, registration, or exemption under
Division 2 (commencing with Section 1200) of the Health and Safety Code or under Part 4
(commencing with Section 16000) of Division 9 of the Welfare and Institutions Code who
maintains a stock of dangerous drugs or dangerous devices.

8 (b) The owner, officer, and partner of a pharmacy, wholesaler, third-party logistics
9 provider, or veterinary food-animal drug retailer shall be jointly responsible, with the pharmacist10 in-charge, responsible manager, or designated representative-in-charge, for maintaining the
11 records and inventory described in this section.

12

13 10. Section 4105 of the Code requires, in pertinent part, that unless a waiver is granted by
14 the Board, all records and other documentation of the acquisition and disposition of dangerous
15 drugs and devices by any entity licensed by the Board be retained on the licensed premises, in a
16 readily retrievable form, for three years from the date of making.

11. Section 4113, subdivision (c), of the Code states:

18 The pharmacist-in-charge shall be responsible for a pharmacy's compliance with all state19 and federal laws and regulations pertaining to the practice of pharmacy.

12. Section 4301 of the Code states, in pertinent part:

The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional
conduct or whose license has been issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is
not limited to, any of the following:

(j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, or any other state, or of the United
States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs.

(o) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or abetting the violation of or conspiring to violate any provision or term of this chapter or of the applicable federal and state laws and regulations governing pharmacy, including regulations established by the board or by any other state or federal regulatory agency.

13. Section 4307(a) of the Code states that:

Any person who has been denied a license or whose license has been revoked or is under 7 suspension, or who has failed to renew his or her license while it was under suspension, or who 8 has been a manager, administrator, owner, member, officer, director, associate, or partner of any 9 partnership, corporation, firm, or association whose application for a license has been denied or 10 revoked, is under suspension or has been placed on probation, and while acting as the manager. 11 administrator, owner, member, officer, director, associate, or partner had knowledge of or 12 knowingly participated in any conduct for which the license was denied, revoked, suspended, or 13 placed on probation, shall be prohibited from serving as a manager, administrator, owner, 14 member, officer, director, associate, or partner of a licensee as follows: 15

(1) Where a probationary license is issued or where an existing license is placed on
probation, this prohibition shall remain in effect for a period not to exceed five years.

(2) Where the license is denied or revoked, the prohibition shall continue until the license isissued or reinstated.

14. Section 4126.5 of the Code states:

(a) A pharmacy may furnish dangerous drugs only to the following:

(1) A wholesaler owned or under common control by the wholesaler from whom the
dangerous drug was acquired.

(2) The pharmaceutical manufacturer from whom the dangerous drug was acquired.

(3) A licensed wholesaler acting as a reverse distributor.

(4) Another pharmacy or wholesaler to alleviate a temporary shortage of a dangerous drug
 that could result in the denial of health care. A pharmacy furnishing dangerous drugs pursuant to
 this paragraph may only furnish a quantity sufficient to alleviate the temporary shortage.

4 (5) A patient or to another pharmacy pursuant to a prescription or as otherwise authorized
5 by law.

6 (6) A health care provider that is not a pharmacy but that is authorized to purchase
7 dangerous drugs.

(7) To another pharmacy under common control.

9 (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a violation of this section may subject the
10 person or persons who committed the violation to a fine not to exceed the amount specified
11 in Section 125.9 for each occurrence pursuant to a citation issued by the board.

(c) Amounts due from any person under this section on or after January 1, 2005, shall be
offset as provided under Section 12419.5 of the Government Code. Amounts received by the
board under this section shall be deposited into the Pharmacy Board Contingent Fund.

(d) For purposes of this section, "common control" means the power to direct or cause the
direction of the management and policies of another person whether by ownership, by voting
rights, by contract, or by other means.

15. Section 4306.5 of the Code states:

Unprofessional conduct for a pharmacist may include any of the following:
(a) Acts or omissions that involve, in whole or in part, the inappropriate exercise of his or
her education, training, or experience as a pharmacist, whether or not the act or omission arises in
the course of the practice of pharmacy or the ownership, management, administration, or

23 operation of a pharmacy or other entity licensed by the board.

(b) Acts or omissions that involve, in whole or in part, the failure to exercise or implement
his or her best professional judgment or corresponding responsibility with regard to the
dispensing or furnishing of controlled substances, dangerous drugs, or dangerous devices, or with
regard to the provision of services.

(c) Acts or omissions that involve, in whole or in part, the failure to consult appropriate

patient, prescription, and other records pertaining to the performance of any pharmacy function.

(d) Acts or omissions that involve, in whole or in part, the failure to fully maintain andretain appropriate patient-specific information pertaining to the performance of any pharmacyfunction.

16. Section 4332 of the Code states:

Any person who fails, neglects, or refuses to maintain the records required by Section 4081
or who, when called upon by an authorized officer or a member of the board, fails, neglects, or
refuses to produce or provide the records within a reasonable time, or who willfully produces or
furnishes records that are false, is guilty of a misdemeanor.

10

17. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1714, states in pertinent part:

(b) Each pharmacy licensed by the board shall maintain its facilities, space, fixtures, and
equipment so that drugs are safely and properly prepared, maintained, secured and distributed.
The pharmacy shall be of sufficient size and unobstructed area to accommodate the safe practice
of pharmacy.

(d) Each pharmacist while on duty shall be responsible for the security of the prescription
department, including provisions for effective control against theft or diversion of dangerous
drugs and devices, and records for such drugs and devices. Possession of a key to the pharmacy
where dangerous drugs and controlled substances are stored shall be restricted to a pharmacist.

18. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1718, states:

"Current Inventory" as used in Sections 4081 and 4332 of the Business and Professions
Code shall be considered to include complete accountability for all dangerous drugs handled by
every licensee enumerated in Sections 4081 and 4332. The controlled substances inventories
required by Title 21, CFR, Section 1304 shall be available for inspection upon request for at least
3 years after the date of the inventory.

# CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES/DANGEROUS DRUGS

19. Section 4021 of the Code provides that a "controlled substance" means any substance
listed in Schedules I through V contained in Health and Safety Code section 11053 *et seq.*

20. Section 4022 of the Code states: 1 "Dangerous drug" or "dangerous device" means any drug or device unsafe for self-use in 2 humans or animals, and includes the following: -3 (a) Any drug that bears the legend: "Caution: federal law prohibits dispensing without 4 prescription," "Rx only," or words of similar import. 5 (b) Any device that bears the statement: "Caution: federal law restricts this device to sale by 6 or on the order of a ," "Rx only," or words of similar import, the blank to be filled in 7 with the designation of the practitioner licensed to use or order use of the device. 8 (c) Any other drug or device that by federal or state law can be lawfully dispensed only on 9 prescription or furnished pursuant to Section 4006. 10 21. Promethazine with Codeine Syrup (PCS) is a controlled substance pursuant to Health 11 and Safety Code section 11058 and a dangerous drug pursuant to Business and Professions Code 12 section 4022. 13 22. Norco, or Hydrocodone with Acetaminophen, is a Schedule III controlled substance 14 pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 11056(e)(4) and a dangerous drug pursuant to 15 Business and Professions Code section 4022. However, under federal law, effective 10/6/2014, 16 Norco was rescheduled as a Schedule II controlled substance, pursuant to 21 CFR 17 1308.12(b)(1)(iv). 18 COST RECOVERY 19 23. Section 125.3 of the Code provides, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the 20administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of 21 the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and 22 enforcement of the case. 23 FACTUAL SUMMARY 24 Illegal Furnishing of Dangerous Drugs to Another Pharmacy 25 Between approximately August 27, 2012 and February 4, 2015, Respondents 24. 26 furnished approximately 286,000 tablets of hydrocodone/acetaminophen 10/325 mg and 2,012 27 pints of promethazine with codeine syrup to Getwell Pharmacy and Medical Supply located in 28 7

San Leandro, California. The two dangerous drugs furnished by Respondents to Getwell
 Pharmacy and Medical Supply were not in shortage during this time period.

25. On December 1, 2014, a Board of Pharmacy inspector informed Waterfront
Pharmacy owner and Pharmacist-in-Charge Huante that furnishing hydrocodone/acetaminophen
and promethazine with codeine syrup to another pharmacy was not permitted by law because
there were no shortages of either drug. Invoices dated January 27, 2015, February 3, 2015 and
February 4, 2015 indicate that Respondents provided a total of 156 pints of promethazine with
codeine to Getwell Pharmacy and Medical Supply, even after being specifically advised against
this activity by the Board inspector.

26. An audit conducted by Board of Pharmacy inspectors for the audit period from
 November 27, 2012 through December 1, 2014, revealed that Waterfront Pharmacy did not
 account for approximately 160,058 tablets of hydrocodone/acetaminophen 10/325 mg. and
 approximately 1,421 pints of promethazine with codeine syrup.

### FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

## (Illegally Furnishing Dangerous Drugs to Another Pharmacy)

27. Respondents are each and severally subject to disciplinary action under Code sections
4126.5(a)(4) and 4301, subsections (j) and (o), in that they furnished dangerous drugs to Getwell
Pharmacy and Medical Supply during a time period where there was no shortage of the dangerous
drugs, in violation of pharmacy law, as set forth above in paragraphs 24-25.

#### SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

#### (Failure to Exercise Due Caution)

28. Respondents are each and severally subject to disciplinary action under Code sections
4306.5(b), and 4301, subsections (j) and (o), in that Respondents failed to exercise professional
judgment or corresponding responsibility with regard to the dispensing or furnishing of controlled
substances and dangerous drugs, as set forth above in paragraphs 24-25.

20	31. Respondents are each and severally subject to disciplinary action under code section	
21	4301 in that Respondents, as set forth above in paragraphs 24-26, engaged in unprofessional

24	32. Pursuant to Code section 4307, if discipline is imposed on Pharmacy Permit Number
