20	1. Virginia Herold (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity as			
21	the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy, Department of Consumer Affairs.			
22	2. On or about December 15, 2005, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacy Technician			
23	Registration Number TCH 66503 to James Earl Mansfield (Respondent). The Pharmacy			
24	Technician Registration expired on March 31, 2017, and has not been renewed.			
25	JURISDICTION			
26	3. This Accusation is brought before the Board of Pharmacy (Board), Department of			
27	Consumer Affairs, under the authority of the following laws. All section references are to the			
28	Business and Professions Code unless otherwise indicated.			
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4. Section 4300.1 of the Code states:

"The expiration, cancellation, forfeiture, or suspension of a board-issued license by operation of law or by order or decision of the board or a court of law, the placement of a license on a retired status, or the voluntary surrender of a license by a licensee shall not deprive the board of jurisdiction to commence or proceed with any investigation of, or action or disciplinary proceeding against, the licensee or to render a decision suspending or revoking the license."

STATUTORY PROVISIONS

5. Section 4301 of the Code states, in pertinent part:

"The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional conduct or whose license has been issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is not limited to, any of the following:

"(f) The commission of any act involving moral turpitude, dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or

corruption, whether the act is committed in the course of relations as a licensee or otherwise, and

whether the act is a felony or misdemeanor or not.

"(h) The administering to oneself, of any controlled substance, or the use of any dangerous drug or of alcoholic beverages to the extent or in a manner as to be dangerous or injurious to oneself, to a person holding a license under this chapter, or to any other person or to the public, or to the extent that the use impairs the ability of the person to conduct with safety to the public the practice authorized by the license.

"(j) The violation of any of the statutes of this state, of any other state, or of the United States regulating controlled substances and dangerous drugs.

"(o) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, or assisting in or abetting the violation of or conspiring to violate any provision or term of this chapter or of the applicable federal and state laws and regulations governing pharmacy, including regulations established by the

board or by any other state or federal regulatory agency.

- 6. Section 4327 of the Code states that any person who, while on duty, sells, dispenses or compounds any drug while under the influence of any dangerous drug or alcoholic beverages shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 7. Section 4059 of the Code states, in pertinent part, that a person may not furnish any dangerous drug except upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.7.
 - 8. Section 4060 of the Code states:

A person shall not possess any controlled substance, except that furnished to a person upon the prescription of a physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, veterinarian, or naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.7, or furnished pursuant to a drug order issued by a certified nurse-midwife pursuant to Section 2746.51, a nurse practitioner pursuant to Section 2836.1, a physician assistant pursuant to Section 3502.1, a naturopathic doctor pursuant to Section 3640.5, or a pharmacist pursuant to Section 4052.1, 4052.2, or 4052.6. This section does not apply to the possession of any controlled substance by a manufacturer, wholesaler, third-party logistics provider, pharmacy, pharmacist, physician, podiatrist, dentist, optometrist, veterinarian, naturopathic doctor, certified nurse-midwife, nurse practitioner, or physician assistant, if in stock in containers correctly labeled with the name and address of the supplier or producer.

This section does not authorize a certified nurse-midwife, a nurse practitioner, a physician assistant, or a naturopathic doctor, to order his or her own stock of dangerous drugs and devices.

- 9. Health and Safety Code section 11170 states that no person shall prescribe, administer, or furnish a controlled substance for himself.
- 10. Health and Safety Code section 11173, subd. (a), states that no person shall obtain or attempt to obtain controlled substances, or procure or attempt to procure the administration of or prescription for controlled substances, (1) by fraud, deceit, misrepresentation, or subterfuge; or (2) by the concealment of a material fact.

COST RECOVERY PROVISION

11. Section 125.3 of the Code states, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of the case.

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12. Ketamine is a Schedule III controlled substance under Health and Safety Code section 11056, subdivision (g), and a dangerous drug under Business and Professions Code section 4022. It is used for pain relief and sedation.

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FACTUAL BACKGROUND

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13. On or about September 23, 2016, while working as a pharmacy technician at Health First Pharmacy in Windsor, California, Respondent injected himself with ketamine that he took from the pharmacy. He obtained access to the drug by removing the drawer above the locked cabinet where it was kept. Respondent subsequently displayed symptoms of impairment at work, including slurred speech and unsteady gait. Respondent lacked a valid prescription for the ketamine.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE (Unprofessional Conduct: Theft of Controlled Substance) (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (f))

Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for unprofessional conduct in that he committed theft of a controlled substance (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (f)). The circumstances are described in paragraph 13, above.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE (Unprofessional Conduct: Unlawful Possession of Controlled Substance) (Bus. & Prof. Code, §§ 4060 and 4301, subd. (j) and/or (o))

15. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for unprofessional conduct in that he unlawfully possessed a controlled substance (Bus. & Prof. Code. §§ 4060 and 4301, subd. (j) and/or (o)). The circumstances are described in paragraph 13, above.

(Unprofessional Conduct: Unlawful Self-Administration of Controlled Substance) (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (h) and/or (o); Health & Saf. Code, § 11170)

Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for unprofessional conduct in that he unlawfully self-administered a controlled substance (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (h) and/or (o); Health & Saf. Code, § 11170). The circumstances are described in paragraph 13, above.

FOURTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct: Unlawful Furnishing of Controlled Substance) (Bus. & Prof. Code, §§ 4301, subd. (j and/or (o), and 4059, subd. (a))

17. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for unprofessional conduct in that he unlawfully furnished a controlled substance (Bus. & Prof. Code, §§ 4301, subd. (j and/or (o), and 4059, subd. (a)). The circumstances are described in paragraph 13, above.

FIFTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct: Obtaining Controlled Substance by Fraud, Deceit, or Subterfuge) (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (j) and/or (o); Health &Saf. Code, § 11173, subd. (a))

18. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for unprofessional conduct in that he obtained a controlled substance by fraud, deceit, or subterfuge (Bus. & Prof. Code, § 4301, subd. (j) and/or (o); Health & Saf. Code, § 11173, subd. (a)). The circumstances are described in paragraph 13, above.

SIXTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Unprofessional Conduct: Sale, Dispensing, Compounding While Under Influence of Drug) (Bus. & Prof. Code, §§ 4301, subd. (h), and 4327)

19. Respondent has subjected his pharmacy technician registration to discipline for unprofessional conduct in that he engaged in sale, dispensing, or compounding of a drug under while under the influence of a dangerous drug (Bus. & Prof. Code, §§ 4301, subd. (h), and 4327). The circumstances are described in paragraph 13, above.

PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters alleged in this Accusation, and that following the hearing, the Board of Pharmacy issue a decision:

- 1. Revoking or suspending Pharmacy Technician Registration Number TCH 66503, issued to James Earl Mansfield;
- 2. Ordering James Earl Mansfield to pay the Board of Pharmacy the reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of this case, pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 125.3; and

1	3. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.		
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
