19 Complainant alleges:

20 **PARTIES**

21 1. Virginia K. Herold (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official
22 capacity as the Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy, Department of Consumer Affairs.

23 2. On or about February 25, 2004, the Board of Pharmacy issued Pharmacy Technician
24 Registration Number TCH 55352 to Stephanie Michelle Wasbotten (Respondent). The original
25 Pharmacy Technician Registration was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the charges
26 brought in this Accusation and will expire on January 31, 2020, unless renewed.

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1 section 1704, also requires State of California licensees to notify the board of a change of
2 residence address within 30 days.

3 7. Section 4300 of the Business and Professions Code, in pertinent part, states:

4 “(a) Every license issued may be suspended or revoked.

5 “(b) The board shall discipline the holder of any license issued by the board, whose default
6 has been entered or whose case has been heard by the board and found guilty, by any of the
7 following methods:

8 “(1) Suspending judgment.

9 “(2) Placing him or her upon probation.

10 “(3) Suspending his or her right to practice for a period not exceeding one year.

11 “(4) Revoking his or her license.

12 “(5) Taking any other action in relation to disciplining him or her as the board in its
13 discretion may deem proper.”

14 8. Section 4301 of the Business and Professions Code, in pertinent part, states:

15 “The board shall take action against any holder of a license who is guilty of unprofessional
16 conduct or whose license has been issued by mistake. Unprofessional conduct shall include, but is
17 not limited to, any of the following:

18 . . .

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20 “(h) The administering to oneself, of any controlled substance, or the use of any
21 dangerous drug or of alcoholic beverages to the extent or in a manner as to be dangerous or
22 injurious to oneself, to a person holding a license under this chapter, or to any other person or to
23 the public, or to the extent that the use impairs the ability of the person to conduct with safety to
24 the public the practice authorized by the license.

25 . . .

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27 “(p) Actions or conduct that would have warranted denial of a license.”
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1 COST RECOVERY

2 9. Section 125.3 of the Business and Professions Code, in pertinent part, states that the
3 board may request the administrative law judge to direct a licensee found to have committed a
4 violation or violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the
5 investigation and enforcement of the case.
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7 FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

8 (Failure to Notify the Board of Change of Address)
9 (Bus. & Prof. Code § 4100; Cal. Code Regs. tit. 16, § 1704)

10 10. Respondent has subjected her license to disciplinary action in that she failed to notify
11 the board of a change in her address of record within 30 days. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 4100 and
12 Cal. Code Regs. tit. 16, § 1704). Specifically, on or about September 2017, Respondent changed
13 her address of record and residence address when she moved to Southern California, but failed to
14 notify the board of the change until on or about January 9, 2018. On January 9, 2018,
15 Respondent confirmed with board inspector Hilda Nip that she was no longer residing at her
16 address of record (1090 Francisco Street, San Francisco, CA), and no longer received mail there.
17 Respondent's failure to advise the board of a change in her address of record within 30 days is a
18 violation of Business and Professions Code section 4100 and California Code of Regulations title
19 16, section 1704.

21 SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

22 (Unprofessional Conduct)
23 (Bus. & Prof. Code § 4301(h))

24 11. Respondent has subjected her license to disciplinary action in that she used
25 alcoholic beverages, to an extent or in a manner dangerous or injurious to herself or, any other
26 person, or the public. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 4301 subd. (h)). Specifically, on July 18, 2017,
27 Respondent sent a text message to her supervisor, Walgreens' pharmacist-in-charge Anne Nelson,
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1 in which she stated that she was going to “jump off the bridge.” Because of her suicidal ideation,
2 Respondent was referred to Walgreens’ Employee Assistance Program. On July 19, 2017, Ms.
3 Nelson learned that Respondent was admitted to a hospital in Southern California. On August 30,
4 2017, Respondent disclosed in a meeting with Walgreens’ management that she had a problem
5 with alcohol abuse and was going to be admitted to an inpatient rehabilitation facility for
6 treatment. On November 21, 2017, the board’s inspector learned that Respondent’s physician had
7 not yet released Respondent to return to work at Walgreens. On January 9, 2008, Respondent
8 acknowledged that she spent thirty-two days addressing her alcohol addiction at an inpatient
9 program, followed by three months at an intensive outpatient program. On February 1, 2018,
10 Respondent’s physician released her to return to work at a Walgreens in Riverside, California.

12 THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

13 (Unprofessional Conduct)
14 (Bus. & Prof. Code § 4301(p))

15 12. Pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 4301, subdivision (p), Respondent
16 has subjected her license to disciplinary action in that her conduct, as described in paragraph (11),
17 meets the criteria for unprofessional conduct that would have justified denial of a pharmacy
18 technician license. (Bus. & Prof. Code § 4301, subd. (p)).
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20 PRAYER

21 WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters alleged in this
22 Accusation, and that following the hearing, the Board of Pharmacy issue a decision:

23 1. Revoking or suspending Original Pharmacy Technician Registration Number TCH
24 55352, issued to Stephanie Michelle Wasbotten;


25 2. Ordering Stephanie Michelle Wasbotten to pay the Board of Pharmacy the reasonable
