- 2. Respondent Kaiser Permanente Corp. doing business as Kaiser Permanente Pharmacy #833 ("Respondent") is represented in this proceeding by attorney John A. Gilbert, Jr., Esq., whose address is John A. Gilbert, Jr., Esq., Hyman, Phelps & McNamara, PC, 700 13th Street, NW, Washington, DC 20005, and by Herb L. Weinberger, Esq., whose address is Herb L. Weinberger, Esq., Fenton Law Group, LLP, 1990 S. Bundy Drive, Suite 777, Los Angeles, C 90025.
- 3. On or about April 17, 2003, the Board issued Pharmacy Permit No. PHY 46384 to Kaiser Permanente Corp., doing business as Kaiser Permanente Pharmacy #833, ("Respondent"). The Pharmacy Permit was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the charges brought in Accusation No. 5533 and will expire on November 1, 2016, unless renewed.

JURISDICTION

- 4. Accusation No. 5533 was filed before the Board and is currently pending against Respondent. The Accusation and all other statutorily required documents were properly served on Respondent on March 7, 2016. Respondent timely filed its Notice of Defense contesting the Accusation.
- 5. A true and correct copy of Accusation No. 5533 is attached hereto, marked Exhibit A, and incorporated herein by reference.

ADVISEMENT AND WAIVERS

- 6. Respondent has carefully read, fully discussed with counsel, and understands the charges and allegations in Accusation No. 5533. Respondent has also carefully read, fully discussed with counsel, and understands the effects of this Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order.
- 7. Respondent is fully aware of its legal rights in this matter, including the right to a hearing on the charges and allegations in the Accusation; the right to be represented by counsel at its own expense; the right to confront and cross-examine the witnesses against it; the right to present evidence and to testify on its own behalf; the right to the issuance of subpoenas to compel

the attendance of witnesses and the production of documents; the right to reconsideration and court review of an adverse decision; and all other rights accorded by the California Administrative Procedure Act and other applicable laws.

8. Respondent voluntarily, knowingly, and intelligently waives and gives up each and every right set forth above.

CULPABILITY

- Respondent understands and agrees that the charges and allegations in Accusation No. 5533, if proven at a hearing, constitute cause for imposing discipline of Respondent's Pharmacy Permit No. PHY 46384.
- 10. For the purpose of resolving the Accusation without the expense and uncertainty of further proceedings, Respondent agrees that, at a hearing, Complaint could establish a factual basis for the charges and allegations in the Accusation, and that Respondent hereby gives up its right to contest those charges and allegations.
- 10. Respondent agrees that its Pharmacy Permit No. PHY 46384 is subject to discipline and it agrees to be bound by the Board's probationary terms as set forth in the Disciplinary Order below.

CONTINGENCY

11. This stipulation shall be subject to approval by the Board of Pharmacy. Respondent understands and agrees that counsel for Complainant and the staff of the Board of Pharmacy may communicate directly with the Board regarding this stipulation and settlement, without notice to or participation by Respondent or its counsel. By signing the stipulation, Respondent understands and agrees that it may not withdraw its agreement or seek to rescind the stipulation prior to the time the Board considers and acts upon it. If the Board fails to adopt this stipulation as its Decision and Order, the Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order shall be of no force or effect, except for this paragraph, it shall be inadmissible in any legal action between the parties, and the Board shall not be disqualified from further action by having considered this matter.

- 12. The parties understand and agree that Portable Document Format ("PDF") and facsimile copies of this Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order, including PDF and facsimile signatures thereto, shall have the same force and effect as the originals.
- 13. This Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order is intended by the parties to be an integrated writing representing the complete, final, and exclusive embodiment of their agreement. It supersedes any and all prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, discussions, negotiations, and commitments (written or oral). This Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order may not be altered, amended, modified, supplemented, or otherwise changed except by a writing executed by an authorized representative of each of the parties.
- 14. In consideration of the foregoing admissions and stipulations, the parties agree that the Board may, without further notice or formal proceeding, issue and enter the following Disciplinary Order:

DISCIPLINARY ORDER

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Pharmacy Permit No. PHY 46384 issued to Respondent Kaiser Permanente Corp., doing business as Kaiser Permanente Pharmacy #833, ("Respondent") is revoked. However, the revocation is stayed and Respondent is placed on probation for five (5) years on the following terms and conditions.

- 1. Civil Penalty. Respondent shall pay a civil penalty in the amount of \$100,000.00 to the Board. Respondent shall make such payment on a payment plan approved by the Board. There shall be no deviation from the payment schedule absent prior written approval by the Board or its designee. Failure to pay such fine by the deadline(s) as directed by the Board or its designee shall constitute a violation of probation.
- 2. Obey All Laws. Respondent owner shall obey all state and federal laws and regulations. Respondent owner shall report any of the following occurrences to the Board, in writing, within seventy-two (72) hours of such occurrence:
 - An arrest or issuance of a criminal complaint for violation of any provision of the Pharmacy Law, state and federal food and drug laws, or state and federal controlled substances laws

- 6. Reimbursement of Board Costs. As a condition precedent to successful completion of probation, Respondent owner shall pay to the Board its costs of investigation and prosecution in the amount of \$5,732.30 payable under terms to be determined by the Board or its designee. The filing of bankruptcy by Respondent owner shall not relieve Respondent of their responsibility to reimburse the Board its costs of investigation and prosecution.
- 7. Probation Monitoring Costs. Respondent owner shall pay any costs associated with probation monitoring as determined by the Board each and every year of probation. Such costs shall be payable to the Board on a schedule as directed by the Board or its designee. Failure to pay such costs by the deadline(s) as directed shall be considered a violation of probation.
- 8. Status of License. Respondent owner shall, at all times while on probation, maintain current licensure with the Board. If Respondent owner submits an application to the Board, and the application is approved, for a change of location, change of permit or change of ownership, the Board shall retain continuing jurisdiction over the license, and the Respondent shall remain on probation as determined by the Board. Failure to maintain current licensure shall be considered a violation of probation.

If Respondent owner's license expires or is cancelled by operation of law or otherwise at any time during the period of probation, including any extensions thereof or otherwise, upon renewal or reapplication Respondent owner's license shall be subject to all terms and conditions of this probation not previously satisfied.

9. License Surrender While on Probation and/or Suspension. Following the effective date of this decision, should Respondent owner discontinue business, Respondent owner may tender the premises license to the Board for surrender. The Board or its designee shall have the discretion whether to grant the request for surrender or take any other action it deems appropriate and reasonable. Upon formal acceptance of the surrender of the license, Respondent will no longer be subject to the terms and conditions of probation.

Upon acceptance of the surrender, Respondent owner shall relinquish the premises wall and renewal license to the Board within ten (10) days of notification by the Board that the surrender is

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accepted. Respondent owner shall further submit a completed Discontinuance of Business form according to Board guidelines and shall notify the Board of the records inventory transfer.

Respondent owner shall also, by the effective date of this decision, arrange for the continuation of care for ongoing patients of the pharmacy by, at minimum, providing a written notice to ongoing patients that specifies the anticipated closing date of the pharmacy and that identifies one or more area pharmacies capable of taking up the patients' care, and by cooperating as may be necessary in the transfer of records or prescriptions for ongoing patients. Within five (5) days of its provision to the pharmacy's ongoing patients, Respondent owner shall provide a copy of the written notice to the Board. For the purposes of this provision, "ongoing patients" means those patients for whom the pharmacy has on file a prescription with one (1) or more refills outstanding, or for whom the pharmacy has filled a prescription within the preceding sixty (60) days.

Respondent owner may not apply for any new licensure from the Board for three (3) years from the effective date of the surrender. Respondent owner shall meet all requirements applicable to the license sought as of the date the application for that license is submitted to the Board.

Respondent owner further stipulates that he or she shall reimburse the Board for its costs of investigation and prosecution prior to the acceptance of the surrender.

10. Notice to Employees. Respondent shall, upon or before the effective date of this Decision, ensure that all employees involved in permit operations are made aware of all the terms and conditions of probation, either by posting a notice of the terms and conditions, circulating such notice, or both. If the notice required by this provision is posted, it shall be posted in a prominent place and shall remain posted throughout the probation period. Respondent owner shall ensure that any employees hired or used after the effective date of this decision are made aware of the terms and conditions of probation by posting a notice, circulating a notice, or both. Additionally, Respondent owner shall submit written notification to the Board, within fifteen (15) days of the effective date of this decision, that this term has been satisfied. Failure to submit such notification to the Board shall be considered a violation of probation.

"Employees" as used in this provision includes all full-time, part-time, volunteer, temporary and relief employees and independent contractors employed or hired at any time during probation.

- 11. Owners and Officers: Knowledge of the Law. Respondent shall provide, within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this decision, signed and dated statements from its owners, including any owner or holder of ten percent (10%) or more of the interest in Respondent or Respondent's stock, and any officer, stating under penalty of perjury that said individuals have read and are familiar with state and federal laws and regulations governing the practice of pharmacy. The failure to timely provide said statements under penalty of perjury shall be considered a violation of probation.
- 12. Posted Notice of Probation. Respondent owner shall prominently post a probation notice provided by the Board in a place conspicuous and readable to the public. The probation notice shall remain posted during the entire period of probation.

Respondent owner shall not, directly or indirectly, engage in any conduct or make any statement which is intended to mislead or is likely to have the effect of misleading any patient, customer, member of the public, or other person(s) as to the nature of and reason for the probation of the licensed entity.

Failure to post such notice shall be considered a violation of probation.

13. Violation of Probation. If a Respondent owner has not complied with any term or condition of probation, the Board shall have continuing jurisdiction over Respondent license, and probation shall be automatically extended until all terms and conditions have been satisfied or the Board has taken other action as deemed appropriate to treat the failure to comply as a violation of probation, to terminate probation, and to impose the penalty that was stayed.

If Respondent owner violates probation in any respect, the Board, after giving Respondent owner notice and an opportunity to be heard, may revoke probation and carry out the disciplinary order that was stayed. Notice and opportunity to be heard are not required for those provisions stating that a violation thereof may lead to automatic termination of the stay and/or revocation of the license. If a petition to revoke probation or an accusation is filed against Respondent during

probation, the Board shall have continuing jurisdiction and the period of probation shall be automatically extended until the petition to revoke probation or accusation is heard and decided.

- 14. Completion of Probation. Upon written notice by the Board or its designee indicating successful completion of probation, Respondent license will be fully restored.
- 15. Community Services Program. Within sixty (60) days of the effective date of this decision, Respondent owner shall submit to the Board or its designee, for prior approval, a community service program in which Respondent shall provide free health-care related services to a community or charitable facility or agency valuing \$10,000.00 in services such as immunizations, sharps disposal containers, brown bags, etc.

Within thirty (30) days of Board approval thereof, Respondent owner shall submit documentation to the Board demonstrating commencement of the community service program. Respondent owner shall report on progress with the community service program in the quarterly reports.

Failure to timely submit, commence, or comply with the program shall be considered a violation of probation.

ACCEPTANCE

I have carefully read the above Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order and have fully discussed it with my attorney, John A. Gilbert, Jr., Esq., and Herb L. Weinberg, Esq. I understand the stipulation and the effect it will have on Pharmacy Permit Number PHY 46384. I enter into this Stipulated Settlement and Disciplinary Order voluntarily, knowingly, and intelligently, and agree to be bound by the Decision and Order of the Board of Pharmacy.

BACKGROUND

- 17. On or about December 6, 2013, Respondent Sise discovered a low inventory of Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325 mg on Respondent Kaiser's drug shelf; the shelf had been full the previous night.
- 18. From on or about December 7 through 9, 2013, Respondent Kaiser's internal investigation and surveillance disclosed that janitor A.G. was stealing the Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325 mg from the shelves of Respondent Kaiser. A.G. confessed he had been stealing the drug for the past six months for self-use and for supplying to his friends. A.G. was terminated on or about January 6, 2014. Respondents' internal investigation revealed a shortage of 64,460 tablets of Hydrocodone/ APAP 10/325mg for the period of June 27, 2013, to December 10, 2013.
- 19. On or about January 9, 2014, Respondents notified the Board that Respondent Pharmacy had experienced a loss of 64,460 tablets of Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325mg. On or about May 7, 2014, Respondent Kaiser submitted an amended report of loss of controlled substances indicating the amended loss of 77,115 tablets of Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325mg.
- 20. From on or about January 14, 2014, through May 13, 2015, the Board's assigned inspector conducted an investigation of Respondents reported drug loss.
- 21. On or about August 27, 2014, the inspector received Respondent's acquisition and disposition records for Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325mg for the period of March 17, 2013 to December 9, 2103. Based upon those records, the inspector's audit results concluded that Respondents' actual shortage of Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325 mg was 75,266 tablets.
- 22. On or about May 13, 2015, the Board issued a notice of non-compliance to Respondent Kaiser and Respondent Sise due to their failure to maintain their dangerous drugs in a safe and secure manner and failure to have records of disposition to account for the inventory shortage of 75,266 tablets of Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325 mg.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Failure to Maintain Dangerous Drugs in Safe and Secure Manner)

- 23. Respondent Kaiser is subject to disciplinary action under Code sections 4300 and 4301, subdivisions (j) and (o), in conjunction with California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1714, subdivision (b), in that Respondent Kaiser failed to maintain its facilities, space, fixtures, and equipment so that drugs in its stock were safely and properly prepared, maintained, secured and distributed. Respondent Kaiser's failures resulted in the loss of 75,266 tablets of the dangerous drug Hydrocodone/ APAP 10/325mg as set forth in paragraphs 17 through 22, above, incorporated herein by reference.
- 24. Respondent Sise, the Pharmacist-in-Charge, is subject to disciplinary action sections 4300 and 4300.1, subdivisions (j) and (o), in conjunction with California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1714, subdivision (d), in that Respondent Sise failed to secure the prescription department of Respondent Kaiser and failed to provide for the effective control against theft or diversion of dangerous drugs resulting in the loss of 75,266 tablets of Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325mg as set forth in paragraphs 17 through 22, above, incorporated herein by reference.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Failure to Maintain Records of Disposition of Dangerous Drugs)

25. Respondent Kaiser and Respondent Sise, the Pharmacist-in-Charge, are subject to disciplinary action under Code sections 4300 and 4300.1, subdivisions (j) and (o), in conjunction with Code sections 4081, subdivision (a), and 4105, in that they failed to maintain and preserve all records of acquisition, disposition, and current inventory of dangerous drugs which resulted in their failure to have records of disposition to account for an inventory shortage of 75,266 tablets of the dangerous drug Hydrocodone/APAP 10/325mg as set forth in paragraphs 17 through 22, above, incorporated herein by reference.

DISCIPLINARY CONSIDERATION

26. In determining the level of discipline to be imposed on Respondent Kaiser, Complainant respectfully requests that the following be considered:

1	On or about February 8, 2011, pursuant to Code sections 4314 and 4301, subdivision		
. 2	(o), and California Code of Regulations ("CCR"), title 16, section 1775, the Board issued		
3	Citation No. 2009 44600 against Respondent Kaiser for violating CCR, title 16, section 1714,		
4	subdivision (b), in that from June 27, 2008, through May 31, 2010, Respondent could not account		
5	for 7,627 tablets of Zolpidem 10mg. A civil penalty was not imposed.
