1	2. On or about June 16, 2020, the Board issued Pharmacy License No. PHY 57816 to
2	Respondent. The Pharmacy License was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the
3	charges brought in Accusation No. 7662 and will expire on July 1, 2024, unless renewed.
4	3. On or about January 25, 2024, Respondent was served by Certified and First Class
5	Mail copies of the Accusation No. 7662, Statement to Respondent, Notice of Defense, Request
6	for Discovery, and Discovery Statutes (Government Code sections 11507.5, 11507.6, and
7	11507.7) at Respondent's address of record which, pursuant to Business and Professions Code
8	section 4100, is required to be reported and maintained with the Board. Respondent's address of
9	record was and is: 250 Hospital Circle, Westminster, CA 92683.
10	4. Service of the Accusation was effective as a matter of law under the provisions of
11	Government Code section 11505, subdivision (c) and/or Business and Professions Code section
12	124.
13	5. Government Code section 11506, subdivision (c) states, in pertinent part:
14	The respondent shall be entitled to a hearing on the merits if the respondent
15 16	files a notice of defense and the notice shall be deemed a specific denial of all parts of the accusation not expressly admitted. Failure to file a notice of defense shall constitute a waiver of respondent's right to a hearing, but the agency in its discretion may nevertheless grant a hearing.
17	6. The Board takes official notice of its records and the fact that Respondent failed to
18	file a Notice of Defense within 15 days after service upon them of the Accusation, and therefore
19	waived their right to a hearing on the merits of Accusation No. 7662.
20	7. California Government Code section 11520, subdivision (a) states, in pertinent part:
21	If the respondent either fails to file a notice of defense or to appear at the
22	hearing, the agency may take action based upon the respondent's express admissions or upon other evidence and affidavits may be used as evidence without any notice to
23	respondent
24	8. Pursuant to its authority under Government Code section 11520, the Board finds
25	Respondent is in default. The Board will take action without further hearing and, based on the
26	relevant evidence contained in the Default Decision Investigatory Evidence Packet in this matter,
27	finds that the charges and allegations in Accusation No. 7662, are separately and severally, found
28	to be true and correct by clear and convincing evidence.
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	(BLESSING PHARMACY, INC.) DEFAULT DECISION & ORDER Case No. 7662

1	9. The Board finds that the actual costs for Investigation and Enforcement are as
2	follows: Board Costs are \$17,091.25, half of which is \$8,545.62. DOJ Costs at the time of this
3	default are \$12,916.25, half of which is \$6,458.12; for a grand total of \$15,003.74 charged to
4	Respondent Blessing Pharmacy, Inc.
5	DETERMINATION OF ISSUES
6	1. Based on the foregoing findings of fact, Respondent Blessing Pharmacy, Inc. has
7	subjected its Pharmacy License No. PHY 57816 to discipline.
8	2. The agency has jurisdiction to adjudicate this case by default.
9	3. The Board is authorized to revoke Respondent's Pharmacy License based on the
10	following violations alleged in the Accusation which are supported by the evidence contained in
11	the Default Decision Investigatory Evidence Packet in this case:
12	a. Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code sections
13	4301 subdivision (o), and 4081 subdivision (b), for violating Code sections 4081 subdivision (a)
14	and 4105 subdivisions (a) and (c), in that it failed to maintain all records of acquisition and
15	disposition for at least three years and to maintain a current inventory of dangerous drugs.
16	b. Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code section
17	4301, subdivision (f), for its dishonest, fraudulent, deceitful, and corrupt acts when it billed
18	insurance companies for tens of thousands more capsules of various drugs than it acquired from
19	wholesalers.
20	c. Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code section
21	4301, subdivision (g), for knowingly making or signing certificates or documents that falsely
22	represent the existence or nonexistence of a state of facts when it billed insurance companies for
23	tens of thousands more capsules of various drugs than it acquired from wholesalers.
24	d. Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code section
25	4301, subdivision (f), for their dishonest, fraudulent, deceitful, and corrupt acts when it failed to
26	reverse adjudicate prescriptions on a timely basis which had not been picked up by patients and
27	instead left them in the waiting bin.
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e. Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code section
 4301, subdivision (g), for knowingly making or signing certificates or documents that falsely
 represent the existence or nonexistence of a state of facts, when it failed to reverse adjudicate
 prescriptions on a timely basis which had not been picked up by patients and instead left them in
 the waiting bin between July 19, 2022, and November 30, 2022.

f. Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code section
4301, subdivision (o), for violating the California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1714,
subdivisions (b) and (c), in that the pharmacy was unclean and in poor condition.

g. Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code section
4301, subdivisions (j) and (o), for violating Code section 4169, subdivision (a), and Health and
Safety Code sections 111295 and 111260, in that it stored medications in their refrigerator at a
temperature of 18.6°C (64.4°F), but those medications are required to be stored between 2° and
8°C (36° and 46°F).

h. Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code section
4301, subdivision (o), for violating Code of Federal Regulations, title 21, section 1304.11,
subdivision (c), in that it failed to keep a biennial inventory of all stocks of controlled substances
at least every two years

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Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code section
 4301, subdivision (o), for violating Code sections 4113, subdivisions (a) and (d), and 4305,

20 subdivision (b), in that, between March 15, 2021, and June 2, 2021, a period of almost 3 months,

21 Blessing Pharmacy had no pharmacist-in-charge, but dispensed 1,643 prescriptions.

j. Respondent Blessing Pharmacy is subject to disciplinary action under Code section
4301, subdivision (o), for violating Code sections 4113, subdivisions (a) and (d), and 4305,

subdivision (b), in that since June 14, 2023, Blessing Pharmacy has not designated and registereda new pharmacist-in-charge from that point, to present.

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1	<u>ORDER</u>
2	IT IS SO ORDERED that Pharmacy License No. PHY 57816, issued to Respondent
3	Blessing Pharmacy, Inc. is revoked.
4	Upon revocation per this Order, under Business and Professions Code section 4307,
5	subdivision (a), Respondents shall be prohibited from serving as a manager, administrator, owner,
6	member, officer, director, associate, partner, or serving in any other position with management or
7	control of a licensee. This prohibition shall continue until the license is issued or reinstated.
8	Upon revocation per this Order, under Business and Professions Code section 4307,
9	subdivision (a), Thuong Trieu, Owner and CEO of Blessing Pharmacy, Inc., shall be prohibited
10	from serving as a manager, administrator, owner, member, officer, director, associate, partner, or
11	serving in any other position with management or control of a licensee. This prohibition shall
12	continue until the license is issued or reinstated.
13	Pursuant to Government Code section 11520, subdivision (c), Respondent may serve a
14	written motion requesting that the Decision be vacated and stating the grounds relied on within
15	seven (7) days after service of the Decision on Respondent. The agency in its discretion may
16	vacate the Decision and grant a hearing on a showing of good cause, as defined in the statute.
17	This Decision shall become effective at 5:00 p.m. on May 23, 2024.
18	It is so ORDERED on April 23, 2024.

22	pharmacy, the Pharmacist-in-Charge shall complete a self-assessment for compounding
23	pharmacies developed by the board.
24	24. California Code of Regulations, title 16, section 1761 states, in pertinent part:
25	(a) No pharmacist shall compound or dispense any prescription which contains any significant error, omission, irregularity, uncertainty, ambiguity or
26	alteration. Upon receipt of any such prescription, the pharmacist shall contact the prescriber to obtain the information needed to validate the prescription.

12	of the registrant and intended for distribution as complimentary samples. A separate inventory shall be made for each registered location and each independent activity
13	registered, except as provided in paragraph $(e)(4)$ of this section. In the event controlled substances in the possession or under the control of the registrant are
15	stored at a location for which he/she is not registered, the substances shall be included in the inventory of the registered location to which they are subject to
16	control or to which the person possessing the substance is responsible. The inventory may be taken either as of opening of business or as of the close of business on the inventory date and it shall be indicated on the inventory.
17	(b) Initial inventory date. Every person required to keep records shall take an
18	inventory of all stocks of controlled substances on hand on the date he/she first engages in the manufacture, distribution, or dispensing of controlled substances, in
19	accordance with paragraph (e) of this section as applicable. In the event a person commences business with no controlled substances on hand, he/she shall record this fact as the initial inventory.
20	fact as the initial inventory.
21	(c) Biennial inventory date. After the initial inventory is taken, the registrant shall take a new inventory of all stocks of controlled substances on hand at least
22	every two years. The biennial inventory may be taken on any date which is within two years of the previous biennial inventory date.

25	<u>COST RECOVERY</u>
26	27. Section 125.3 of the Code states, in pertinent part, that the Board may request the
27	administrative law judge to direct a licentiate found to have committed a violation or
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	(BLESSING PHARMACY, INC. and VICKY KIM-ANH VU) ACCUSAT

1	violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the			
2	investigation and enforcement of the case.			
3	DEFINITIONS			
4	28. Creon is a brand name for pancrelipase, a dangerous drug pursuant to Business			
5	and Professions Code section 4022. It is used to treat malabsorption syndrome due to certain			
6	pancreatic problems.			
7	29. Dexilant is a brand name for dexlansoprazole, a dangerous drug pursuant to			
8	Business and Professions Code section 4022. It is used to treat heartburn, gastroesophageal			
9	reflux disease, and esophageal damage.			
10	FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS			
11	30. Blessing Pharmacy Inc. is a licensed pharmacy located in Westminster,			
12	California. Vicky Kim-Anh Vu (Vicky Vu) is a licensed pharmacist and was the pharmacist-			
13	in-charge at Blessing Pharmacy from June 2, 2021, through June 14, 2023.			
14	31. In August 2022, the Board received a complaint against Blessing Pharmacy from			
15	Humana (an insurance company) alleging significant discrepancies between the quantities of			
16	medications that Blessing Pharmacy billed the insurance company, as compared to the			
17	quantities of those medications that Blessing Pharmacy had purchased from wholesalers.			
18	32. In October 2022, the Board received another complaint against Blessing			
19	Pharmacy, this one from a private party. The complaint alleged that the condition of the			
20	pharmacy is unsafe for dispensing medications, that the pharmacy does not dispense all the			
21	medications that it bills to insurance companies, that the pharmacy is run by an acupuncturist,			
22	T.X., who is not the registered owner of the pharmacy and is not a licensed pharmacist, and			
23	that the pharmacy does not perform regular controlled substance inventories, among other			
24	allegations.			
25	33. A Board inspector conducted an inspection of Blessing Pharmacy on December			
26	14, 2022, concerning both sets of allegations. The inspector immediately noted that the			
27	pharmacy is located inside a medical building and is next door to an acupuncture clinic			
28	operated by T.X. When the Board inspector arrived, T.X. introduced herself as the manager			
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	(BLESSING PHARMACY, INC. and VICKY KIM-ANH VU) ACCUSATIO			

- of the pharmacy and medical building, and stated she practices acupuncture next door.Pharmacist-in-charge Vicky Vu was also present for the inspection.
- 3 34. The Board inspector attempted to work with Vicky Vu during the inspection, and 4 to ask Ms. Vu about the pharmacy's general operations. Ms. Vu stated that T.X. managed the 5 pharmacy. Ms. Vu could not identify the owner of the pharmacy. T.X. frequently interjected 6 herself into this process and generally interfered during the course of the inspection.

7 35. The Board inspector requested a tour of the pharmacy and quickly observed that it
8 was cluttered, disorganized, and unclean. As more of these facts came to light, T.X. stated
9 that Ms. Vu's "brain was not working right" and that she, T.X., was *not* involved in the
10 pharmacy's ownership or management.

36. The Board inspector requested and received a stock-on-hand report for three
drugs that appeared in Humana's complaint (Creon DR 24,000 unit capsules, Creon DR
36,000 unit capsules, and Dexilant DR 60 mg capsules), along with the pharmacy's
dispensing records between January 1, 2020, and December 14, 2022. The Board inspector
also contacted Blessing Pharmacy's wholesalers after the inspection to verify acquisition
records for these same three drugs in Humana's complaint.

37. From all this information, the Board inspector was able to document that Blessing 17 Pharmacy reported dispensing thousands more units of these three drugs than it acquired from 18 the wholesalers between January 1, 2020, and December 14, 2022. For the Creon DR 24,000 19 unit capsules, Blessing Pharmacy reported dispensing, and billed to insurance companies, 2017,580 more capsules than it acquired from wholesalers. For the Creon DR 36,000 unit 21 capsules, Blessing Pharmacy reported dispensing, and billed to insurance companies, 9,920 22 more capsules than it acquired from wholesalers. For the Dexilant DR 60 mg capsules, 23 24 Blessing Pharmacy reported dispensing, and billed to insurance companies, 16,290 more capsules than it acquired from wholesalers. Between these three drugs, Blessing Pharmacy 25 reported dispensing 43,790 more capsules than it acquired from wholesalers. Accounting for 26 stock on hand for these three drugs, the total variance between the number of capsules 27

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Blessing Pharmacy reported dispensing and possessing on hand, beyond what it acquired from wholesalers, was 49,884 capsules.

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3 38. From Blessing Pharmacy's dispensing records, the Board inspector was also able 4 to determine the approximate dollar amount for these discrepancies. Using averages for what 5 the insurance companies were paying for each of these three types of drug capsules, the Board 6 inspector determined that Blessing Pharmacy billed insurers almost half of \$1 million for the 7 49,884 capsules that it supposedly dispensed to patients, but did not purchase from 8 wholesalers.

39. 9 The Board inspector reviewed the waiting bin at Blessing Pharmacy to determine the status of active prescriptions and dispensing. The waiting bin is the location for 10 prescriptions that have been processed and verified by the pharmacist, and are ready to be 11 dispensed to patients. The Board inspector discovered 54 active, filled prescriptions in the 12 waiting bin that were processed between July 19, 2022, and November 30, 2022, that had not 13 14 been picked up by patients. The date of the inspection was December 14, 2022, so some of these prescriptions dated back a full six months. Common industry practice is to reverse 15 charges and return to stock prescriptions that are not picked up by patients within 14 days. 16

40. The Board inspector collected the labels that were on the bags of the non-17 dispensed prescriptions in the waiting bin. With these labels and the pharmacy's dispensing 18 records, the Board inspector was able to determine that the total amount of money that 19 Blessing Pharmacy billed to insurance companies for the 54 prescriptions was almost 20\$22,000. Blessing Pharmacy had billed insurance companies for these prescriptions, but 21 when no patients came to pick them up, they failed to reverse the prescriptions (and 22 commensurate charges) and to return them to stock. Instead, the prescriptions sat for months, 23 24 uncollected, in Blessing Pharmacy's waiting bin.

41. Concerning the operating conditions of Blessing Pharmacy, the Board inspector
observed that the pharmacy's sink was not maintained in a clean and orderly condition. It was
covered in lime and dirt stains. The refrigerator, containing medications for storage, was
running a temperature of 18.6°C (64.4°F). There were 135 boxes of 17 different kinds of

medications being stored in the pharmacy's refrigerator. These medications are required to be
 stored between 2° and 8°C (36° and 46°F). For this reason, Blessing Pharmacy was
 maintaining in its possession medications that were adulterated and misbranded.

4 42. The Board inspector requested to view Blessing Pharmacy's DEA Biennial
5 Inventory of controlled substances on hand. Pharmacist-in-charge Vicky Vu stated that the
6 pharmacy had conducted no such inventory. Ms. Vu stated that the pharmacy did not
7 dispense Schedule II controlled substances, and therefore the inventory was not required.
8 However, Blessing Pharmacy dispensed almost 20,000 Schedule III-V controlled substance
9 prescriptions between January 1, 2020, and December 14, 2022; and these controlled
10 substances are required to be included in the DEA Biennial Inventory.

43. According to the Board's records, Blessing Pharmacy employed numerous 11 pharmacists-in-charge between 2021 and 2023. Three of those pharmacists-in-charge were 12 employed by Blessing Pharmacy for less than one month. Vicky Vu, the pharmacist-in-13 14 charge at the time of the inspections, held that position between June 2, 2021, and June 14, 2023. However, Blessing Pharmacy had no pharmacist-in-charge registered with the Board 15 between March 15, 2021, and June 2, 2021, when Vicky Vu assumed that role, a period of 16 almost 3 months. During that time, when it had no pharmacist-in-charge, Blessing Pharmacy 17 dispensed 1,643 prescriptions. Additionally, Blessing Pharmacy has had no registered 18 pharmacist-in-charge since Vicky Vu disassociated as pharmacist-in-charge on June 14, 2023, 19 up to present. 20

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FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

(Maintenance of Records of Dangerous Drugs and Devices; Current Inventory)

44. Respondents Blessing Pharmacy and Vicky Vu are subject to disciplinary action
under Code sections 4301 subdivision (o), and 4081 subdivision (b), for violating Code
sections 4081 subdivision (a) and 4105 subdivisions (a) and (c), in that they failed to maintain
all records of acquisition and disposition for at least three years and to maintain a current
inventory of dangerous drugs as defined by title 16, California Code of Regulations, section
1718, in that between January 1, 2020, and December 14, 2022, they reported dispensing

9	companies for 49,884 more capsules of Creon DR 24,000 unit capsules, Creon DR 36,000			
10	unit capsules, and Dexilant DR 60 mg capsules, than they acquired from their wholesalers, in			
11	the amount of almost half of \$1 million, as alleged in paragraphs 36-38 above, incorporated			
12	herein by reference.			
13	THIRD CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE

15	46. Respondents Blessing Pharmacy and Vicky Vu are subject to disciplinary action

18	between January 1, 2020, and December 14, 2022, they billed insurance companies for 49,884			
19	more capsules of Creon DR 24,000 unit capsules, Creon DR 36,000 unit capsules, and			
20	Dexilant DR 60 mg capsules, than they acquired from their wholesalers, in the amount of			
21	almost half of \$1 million, as alleged in paragraphs 36-38 above, incorporated herein by			
22	reference.

24	SEVENTH CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE			
25	(Misbranded and Adulterated Drugs)			
26	50. Respondents Blessing Pharmacy and Vicky Vu are subject to disciplinary action			
27	under Code section 4301, subdivisions (j) and (o), for violating Code section 4169,			
28	subdivision (a), and Health and Safety Code sections 111295 and 111260, in that they stored			
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	(BLESSING PHARMACY, INC. and VICKY KIM-ANH VU) ACCUSATIO			

1	135 boxes of 17 different kinds of medications in their refrigerator at a temperature of 18.6°C			
2	(64.4°F), but those medications are required to be stored between 2° and 8°C (36° and 46°F),
